Goals from Josh Mayhew and Henry Barley on a blustery wet night saw us comfortably take the all important three points. On another night that was all about work rate and commitment to the cause rather than the beautiful game.

On to last Saturday and Wroxham proved to be a more even affair with our opponents taking a surprise lead scoring from a long distance cross, against the run of play it has to be said. We got a goal back through Charlie before half time and went into the break all square at 1-1.

The second half was about the result and not flowing football on a very heavy pitch. The boys worked their socks off and we got our slice of luck with Charlie scoring direct from a corner (I'm sure I heard him saying that he meant it LOL!)

The scoring was completed late on this Josh Hitter getting his goal at the back post.

The wonderful thing was the amount of supporters that witnessed the game, as again I'm sure more and more are travelling and following the team away from home. It must give the lads a massive lift to see so many of you at the away grounds and hear you giving your support. I firmly believe that together you can make a major difference in the run in of the season.

Enjoy the game and let's hope we are celebrating another three points along with England beating the sweaty socks on the Rugby pitch, come the end of Saturday.

badly hampered their promotion dreams, and needed to stop the rot - but they'd have struggled to find more difficult opponents against whom to get back to winning ways. A goalless first half was followed by an opener for the visitors on fifty eight minutes, Josh Mayhew's eleventh of the season - one every two matches - giving his side the lead; and once they got one they quickly added another, Henry Barley doing his best Peter Lorimer impression (ask your...grandad) to make it two-nil.

Unsurprisingly given their defensive record, the Seasiders held onto that advantage, and kept the pressure on the leaders whilst keeping their title hopes firmly alive.

THE OTHER SIDE: GRAYS ATHLETIC

Graps

1890

A.J.C

Although the formation of Grays Athletic is officially 1890, its origins can be traced back to 1888, when the Grays Amateur Athletic Club, which was primarily a cricket and athletic club, formed an association football branch. The modern club can be traced back to the Grays Juniors side formed in 1902, who in 1904 changed their name to Grays Athletic and who in 1906 took over the Grays Recreation Ground, the club's spiritual home for the next 104 years. Senior Status was granted in 1909, whilst in 1912 the club became a founding member of the Athenian League. Over the last hundred years, the club has experienced a roller-coaster ride. Plenty of highs, along with lows, which at times have threatened the clubs' existence.

During the 1920's the club experienced its first boom period, winning the London League three times (1922, 1927 and 1930), as well as two Essex Senior Cup triumphs (1921 and 1923), to add to their first in 1915. Towards the end of World War Two, the club experienced its next successful era, led by centre-forward, Harry Brand, who went on to become the club's record scorer with 269 goals scored between 1944 and 1952. Inspired by his goals, the Blues won the East Anglian Cup and another Essex Senior Cup in 1945. The club also won the inaugural, Corinthian League Championship, a league which as well as being founder members they were instrumental in forming.

The club re-joined the Athenian League in 1958, which gradually heralded a decline in fortunes. During the late 1960s and 1970s, the club was locked in a struggle with the trustees of the Recreation Ground to secure the venue's future. This was finally sorted in 1981 when club patron Ron Billings was persuaded to buy the ground by then club director Bryan Coker and Jeff and Fred Saxton who were the club's joint



managers at the time. With the future of the ground secured the club was about to enter another period of success. Businessman Jim Myers, owner of the Boys from Rathbone Street retail chain, was persuaded to come aboard as the new chairman. He set a target of Isthmian Premier Division football, within five years (it would take six). The first step in getting there was achieved in 1983, when the club finished as runners-up in the Athenian League, earning promotion to Division Two of the Isthmian League. Just when it seemed the club's troubles had gone, disaster struck when the 400-seater wooden stand was burned to the ground after gracing the Rec for over sixty years. This led Mr Billings to undertake ground improvements, which included new changing rooms, an indoor ballcourt and bar development.

The 1984-85 season saw the Blues secure the Isthmian League Division Two South title. Three years later promotion to the Isthmian Premier Division was achieved after finishing as runners-up to Marlow, despite gaining 100 points during the season. The club enjoyed a nine-season stay in the Premier Division, with two fifth places, in their first two seasons at that level being the highest. In 1992 the Isthmian League Cup was won, defeating league runners-up Enfield 3-1 in the final held at Dagenham's, Victoria Road Ground. Sadly in 1997, the Blues were relegated back to Division One, with the final match of the season seeing longstanding managers Jeff and Fred Saxton step down from their roles and the playing retirement of the holder of the club appearances record, Phil Sammons (748 appearances) after fifteen seasons with the Blues.

The club's most successful period came in the early to mid-2000s, with the arrival of Mick Woodward as a director. When former Tottenham Hotspur midfielder, Mark Stimson, stepped up as manager in 2002, it would herald a period of success, that no one at the club had dared to dream. The Blues were founder members of the new Conference South in the 2004-05 season and were its first champions, securing promotion to the top level of the non-league game, for the first time in its history. For good measure, the FA Trophy was also won, when Hucknall Town were defeated 6-5 on penalties, after extra-time had ended 1-1, in the final held at Villa Park.

With players such as Jamie Stuart, Stuart Thurgood, Aaron McLean and Michael Kightly the Blues finished their first top-flight season in third place. The end-of-season play-offs were reached, but unfortunately, a poor display in the first twenty minutes of the first (away) leg of the semi-final, saw the Blues' dream of EFL football ended by Halifax Town, 5-4 on aggregate. The FA Trophy was retained, with the Blues winning it the hard way, by going through the entire competition, only facing Conference National opponents. The final, which was held at West Ham's, Boleyn Ground, saw nearly ten thousand Blues fans in the attendance of 14,000. First-half goals from Michael Kightly and Glenn Poole would send them home happy, with Grays defeating Woking by two goals to nil.

Shortly after the 2005-06 season had ended, Mark Stimson and his assistant manager, Scott Barrett, stepped down from their roles. They were replaced by former Leeds United player Frank Gray, although his reign was short, lasting only until October, when he was sacked shortly after a defeat by Bromley, in the FA Cup. It was a season where the star players of the previous few years moved on, with the club being involved in a fight against relegation from Christmas.

By the season's end, former Tottenham defender, Justin Edinburgh was in charge and the Blues just avoided relegation on the final day of the season. By the 2009-10 season, Mick Woodward had stepped down as Chairman, though still owned most of the shares. Former West Ham midfielder John Moncur became the new Chairman, joined by his friend and local businessman, Andy Swallow, who became vice-chairman. Woodward started the season as CEO, but ended his involvement in the club by November. Andy Swallow stepped in to keep the club running. By the end of the campaign, the club finished bottom. Faced with a substantial rent increase, the club vacated its home ground of the Recreation Ground after 104 years.

Rather than dropping to the Conference South, the club sought to drop a further division



to the Isthmian Premier Division. Being Grays Athletic though, nothing is ever smooth! When the league allocations were revealed, Grays were initially placed in the Essex Senior League. After an appeal to the FA held at Wembley Stadium, the Blues eventually were placed in the Isthmian North Division, a drop of three levels.

Since then, the club has led a nomadic existence, sharing first at East Thurrock United's, Rookery View Ground (2010–2012). For a season the club held the lease at the former Ford United stadium at Rush Green, which was owned by West Ham, but this deal ended in acrimony after a single season. Somewhat against the odds, the club won the Isthmian League North Division and promotion back to the Premier Division in 2013. For the last ten seasons, Aveley F.C. hosted the club's matches.

Firstly, at their old Millfield ground, then at their new Parkview Stadium. Since 2016 the club has been supporter owned, after Andy Swallow agreed to end his interest in the club and pass them to the fans to run the club. For the past seven seasons, long-time Grays supporter, Steve Skinner has been Chairman, with another long-standing supporter, Glyn Jarvis being vice-chairman. Last season under former captain Lewis Dark, Grays reached the Isthmian North Division play-off semi-final and were runners-up in the Essex Thameside Trophy.

This season sees Grays Athletic ground sharing with our oldest rivals Tilbury, at Chadfields. Mark Stimson has returned as manager and Lee Vehit and Gavin Holland, taking over the roles of Chairman and his deputy.

Shortly before the start of the 2023-24 season, Grays Athletic received good news. A joint application with a developer, to bring the former Thurrock F.C.'s ground at Ship Lane, Purfleet, back into football use alongside a pre-delivery inspection car area was granted by Thurrock Council. There still remain two stages of re-affirmation for the development to be finally approved, but Grays Athletic could finally have something it has never had before in its history - a ground which it owns. Along with a strong commitment to the local community, everyone at the club intends for it to be around for many more years.

Lowestoft and Felixstowe continue to battle for top spot, Brentwood climb to fourth, Walthamstow and Gorleston get four, and Witham win in North London

Leaders **Lowestoft Town** had seen their lead at the top of Pitching In isthmian North cut to three points, and they had a tricky trip to fourth place **Bowers and Pitsea** latest on their schedule. The Trawler Boys were five unbeaten and looking for a third successive win, but the Bowers unbeaten run went back even further, eight matches, and they'd won six of their last seven at the Len Salmon so would have been full of hope – hope which would have slipped a little when Jake Reed put the visitors ahead after just eight minutes. Ten minutes after half time Bowers challenge became rather more difficult, Luke Reeve seeing red and Harvey Sayer stepping up to make it two-nil from the spot, but they did get a goal back through Matt Price eleven minutes from time. Sadly for the home fans that just spurred the visitors into action, Sayer making it three-one with eight minutes left, and that was that - a Lowestoft double over their hosts. Brentwood Town, starting the day in fifth spot, travelled to take on the side two places and three points behind them, Heybridge Swifts. The Blues hadn't played since a late, late goal saw them defeated by Lowestoft on February 6th, but prior to that were eight games unbeaten and would have been confident of starting another positive run, particularly as Swifts had lost three of their previous four, and they went ahead after just four minutes, Jesse Olukolu with his first blue goal in his sixth blue match. Swifts levelled at the start of the second half, Jack Adlington-Pile with his seventh goal in seventeen since returning to the club, but the next blow was blue, George Sykes restoring the visitors lead twenty minutes from time. This time the Blues held onto their advantage, and climbed to fourth - although had Swifts not missed a penalty the outcome may have been somewhat different.

Maldon and Tiptree hoped to win at Gorleston and for neighbours Heybridge

That hope dissipated a little when Curtis added a fourth for the Greens twenty one minutes form time, but a red card for Gorleston's George Keys with six minutes left might have made a difference. It didn't, and Gorleston are eleventh.

Grays Athletic and **Walthamstow** met at Tilbury. Stow started the day eight points away from the top five, but with only three defeats from ten were in decent form, and it showed as they charged into a commanding lead. First, Brian Moses put them ahead on eleven minutes – and Moses had another eight minutes before the break, but that was the third, a Ryan Hervel goal on thirty two minutes the meat in that particular sandwich. It was four-nil by half time, an own goal adding to the rout, and although Athletic kept out the visitors after the break it really didn't help much, the damage was already done. Walthamstow close the gap on the top five to seven points.

It feels like **Brightlingsea Regent**, in tenth at kick off, were challenging for a play off place only a few weeks ago, but they travelled to **Redbridge** with thirteen points between them and the top five, which perhaps demonstrated the depths which they had dived of late. The Motormen broke the deadlock in the early stages of the second half, Lewis Clark with the opener, but deep, deep into added time at the end of the match Kurt Smith popped up to earn Regent a point. They stay tenth, Redbridge are fifteenth, and both games between the sides this season have ended level. New Salamis played host to Witham Town, fourteenth v thirteenth. The hosts got back to winning ways last time out, defeating Grays Athletic three-two, but their performances this season had ranged from woeful to wonderful and just about everything in between, so we had no idea what to expect - and given you could very much say the same about their visitors it was difficult to know what to expect. What we got was a speedy start from Witham, an own goal and a Shakeel Morris effort making it two-nil after just eight minutes, but the hosts made a game of it when Christos Batzelis got a goal back with nineteen minutes to go. The visitors held out, however, and took the points back to Essex.

Finally, we had nineteenth v eighteenth and a bunch of travelling bananas (headline image- Sarah Merritt) as **Stowmarket Town** and **Ipswich Wanderers** met at Greens Meadow. There may have been only one place between the sides but that statistic was accompanied by thirteen points, and Stow hadn't yet managed to find a win all season - but they did go ahead in this one, Ewan Gordon-Clement scoring on twenty one minutes. They couldn't hold onto that advantage for long, a Matt 'Steak Bake' Blake spot kick levelling for the visitors seven minutes later, and that turned out to be that. Stow are thirteen points from safety.

SUPERSTARS OF THE SUBCONTINENT

One of football's great mysteries is the struggle of the subcontinent to make an impact on the global game. India now has the biggest population in the world, nearly 1.5 billion people, and yet the nation has been unable to find 11 individuals to get them to a level where they can even take part in a World Cup, let alone compete for one. Of course, football fights a losing battle for popularity with cricket in India, but perennial underachievement didn't have to be the expectation. There was a time when the future of Indian football looked bright, and they reached the summit of their continent's elite.

The Asian nation had shown promise in the previous decade, taking on France in an infamous barefooted performance at the 1948 Olympics and losing by a single goal. The appointment of Syed Abdul Rahim brought a focus on tactics rather than endurance. As the 1950s progressed, he adopted the successful Hungarian style that brought them so close to the World Cup in 1954, and saw his team grow in stature.

India reached the semi-finals of the 1960 Olympics with impressive victories against Hungary and France. But the 1962 Asian Games in Jakarta were nearly missed altogether. The Indian government almost didn't provide the finances for the team to travel to Indonesia, and then, under pressure from some countries, the Indonesian government refused to provide visas for Israeli and Taiwanese athletes.

Guru Dott Sondhi, the Indian member of the International Olympic Committee, suggested the games be renamed the Jakarta games, if not every nation in Asia were able to compete. There was uproar.

India's team arrived in Indonesia to jeers that would continue throughout the tournament. Players had to sit on the floor of the team bus to avoid missiles. The offices of the Indian High Commission were ransacked by baying mobs. Not the best preparation for a talented team.

And the team was talented. Peter Thangaraj had been voted the best goalkeeper in Asia just a few years before. Jarnail Singh was a powerful centre-back who had won international acclaim in the Olympics. Yusuf Khan was a beautifully versatile midfielder who gave the team whatever they needed. And Chuni Goswami, the best footballer India has ever produced, and a prolific inside-forward.



He turned down a trial with Tottenham to stay at home, such was his talent. The omens were promising.

But the atmosphere was not. India wilted under the Indonesian pressure in their first game, against South Korea, who they had never beaten. They slumped to a disappointing 2-0 defeat, with nobody doing themselves any credit. The only superstar who avoided criticism was Thangaraj; the goalkeeper was absent with 'flu.

The second match required a response, and after some harsh words from Rahim, India certainly provided it. Goswami opened the scoring in a 4-1 victory, but Jarnail Singh picked up a head injury toward the end of the match. India's confidence was up, though, and they cruised to a fairly comfortable 2-1 victory over Japan in their final group game, despite a late scare.

In the semi-finals, India would have to overcome a South Vietnam side who were quietly having a very good tournament, having scored 9 and conceded just 1 in the group stages. Rahim brough Jarnail Singh back into the team after missing out against Japan, but decided to reintroduce him as a striker.

India took the lead in the 12th minute, and ran riot in the first half, hitting the post before Jarnail Singh added a second just before half time. But South Vietnam were not overawed, and came out for the second half fighting. They reduced the deficit with a penalty, and then equalised just past the hour. India responded, and upped their attack again. On 75 minutes, Goswami scored a cheeky lob to reestablish their lead. It would turn out to be the winner.

In the final, India's opponents would be South Korea once again. The night before, unable to sleep, the squad went for a walk. They encountered Rahim, smoking in the darkness. With quiet calm, he asked them to win the gold for him.



India flew out of the blocks, and on 17 minutes Goswami danced around a couple of defenders to set up PK Banejee for the lead. Three minutes later, Jarnail Singh - playing as a forward again - headed home a free kick. His move forward confounded the Koreans.

But India didn't extend their lead, and near the end of the game South Korea found a consolation. But the Indian defence held firm, and gave Rahim the gold he had wanted so desperately. As the players celebrated, and the disappointed crowd booed, they found their inspirational manager sitting quietly in the dressing room, crying with joy.

The country and the government were ecstatic, but that joy was short. Having achieved his gold, Rahim - a chain smoker - passed away from lung cancer the following year. His replacements, ever since, have focussed on the physical side of the game, to India's detriment.

As one of his players said, Rahim took Indian football with him to the grave.
