The second half was evenly contested, with us playing the majority of the football while Brightlingsea always posed a threat on the break. We took the lead when Cameron Forde-Brown converted a superb free kick, but that lead didn't last long. Six minutes later, Brightlingsea equalised after a quick breakaway coupled with some poor defending.

To compound our problems, a Josh Hitter own goal in the 79th minute left us chasing the game. From there, it was all-out attack, with us riding our luck on several occasions as we threw caution to the wind.

The equaliser finally came in the fourth minute of added time, with Josh Hitter completing the strangest of hat tricks with an absolutely sublime header. That said – no match ball for you, Josh!

While Josh deserves credit, for me, the real star of that moment was the cross. I haven't seen such a quality delivery in Felixstowe for many years. Cameron's ball was out of this world –delivered with pace, whip, accuracy, and power. It would have been sacrilege for it not to end in a goal.

A 3–3 draw, and I think all who witnessed it would agree it was a fair result on the day.

On Tuesday, we made a little trip to the Island of Canvey to face Concord Rangers. Unfortunately, I couldn't attend the match due to a severe bout of man flu (apologies to those booked on the minibus).

With unavailability and injuries, the squad was down to its bare bones, with three academy students taking their place on the subs bench.


But the boys didn't feel sorry for themselves; they went out and got the job done. Goals from Charlie and Jack before halftime, followed by Callum's effort in the second half, secured a comfortable victory on the night.

Not many people know this...

We have all heard it asked and answered, "How Many Watching?" and the sharp reply "One man and his dog!"

Well, on 6th December 1995 Felixstowe Town were playing at home against Cornard United in the Jewson Premier League and the official recorded attendance paying at the gate was 14, which included, standing just behind the goal at the Dellwood end one man and his dog.

Ok I've taken a bit of literary licence, it wasn't one man and his dog, it was one man, his wife and their dog.



Ben The Dog as he was colloquially known wearing his Felixstowe Port & Town scarf circa 1997/99 and the actual poster the Green distributed to their Saturday night outlets.

Chris & Jayne Ryan were regular supporters at the time and their dog Ben became quite famous and very popular on the Eastern Counties League circuit, all three travelling to away games to watch the Seasiders.

Ben was unique in that he would sit just behind the goal and to the left and watch the game intently, he wasn't averse to a stroke from those who walked past so long as it didn't distract him from the action on the pitch.

Ben followed the Seasiders home and away

from 1987 through to 2001 when he went to that big dog's home in the sky, he saw the club change its name twice, saw them come within a whisker of winning the league as Felixstowe Port & Town but never saw them relegated!

THE POSTER!

On the 4th September 1999 Ben was refused entry to Diss Town, he wasn't a troublemaker, didn't bark excessively and had never bitten anyone, but NO was the firm position of the Diss Town gatemen. He didn't miss much as the game ended 0-0.

Not one to hold a grudge and after all 'rules is rules' Ben sponsored the fixture when Diss arrived early the following season at Dellwood Avenue. The game ended 2-0 to the visitors with Bobby Mayes (signed from us) on the score sheet and Leon Henry debuting for the Seasiders. It captured the imagination with the 'Green 'Un' producing a poster for all their outlets to display and Ben wallowing in his 5 minutes of fame!







THE OTHER SIDE MILDENHALL TOWN

HISTORY

Mildenhall Town are a long-established club, formed in August 1898. Club records from the early years are vague, but it is known that the club won the Suffolk Junior Cup as long ago as 1899/1900 when they defeated Southwold R.A. Volunteers 4-0 in the final.

The club had to wait 93 years for their next County success, lifting the Cambs. Junior Cup in 1992/93 and then the Cambs Invitation Cup in 1996.

The club joined the Bury & District League in 1945, competing well in this league until joining the Cambs. County League in 1969. After many successful years, the club was accepted into the newly established Eastern Counties League Division 1 for the 1988/89 season. After coming to terms with this higher level of football, the club finished runners-up to Clacton Town in 1999 to attain promotion to the ECL Premier Division under the guidance of the managerial team of Steve O'Donoghue, Rob Steele & Jez George. The club also reached the Suffolk Premier Cup final in 2000, losing 1-0 to Lowestoft Town.

Under the leadership of Chairman Brian Brigden, the club also underwent a major transformation during the 90's, bringing the ground up to current standards, and building the excellent clubhouse whilst still retaining an enviable central location in the town.

Trevor Munns took over the managerial hot-seat in 2001, leading to six years of consistently creditable finishing positions in the ECL Premier Division, culminating in a superb 2nd spot in 2006/2007 garnering 97 points. Unfortunately, Wroxham got 101 points that season.

'Hall again reached the Suffolk Premier Cup final in 2003, but lost to the very strong AFC



Sudbury in the final at Ram Meadow. The club also had two excellent runs in the FA Vase, losing away to Hillingdon Borough in 2006 and Billingham Synthonia in 2007, both times reaching the last 16. The 2006 run included the defeat of the then Vase holders, Didcot Town, in a replay at Recway in front of a club record crowd of 320 spectators, probably the finest night in the club's history.

Martin Tuck succeeded Brian Brigden as Chairman in 2002, and he led the club through a turbulent, although largely successful period. Trevor Munns resigned in November 2007 to be succeeded by local duo of Dave Pinkowski and Tony Lyes. The highlight of their reign was a 7-0 drubbing of Lowestoft Town, their heaviest defeat for 50 years.

This duo ended their stint during 2008/2009 and in April 2009 the club appointed former Bolton Wanderers & Norwich City star Simon Charlton as team manager. Charlton had a largely successful season in charge, culminating in a superb 3-1 victory over Wisbech Town in the Cambs Invitation Cup final at the Abbey Stadium.

Simon moved on in the summer of 2010 to be replaced by ex Woodbridge Town & Stowmarket Town boss and qualified EUFA coach Christian Appleford. Christian, ably assisted by Tom Youngs, led the team to immediate success by retaining the Cambs Invitation Cup with a 2-0 victory over Haverhill Rovers in the final and finishing a creditable 5th place in the league. Christian left the club in November 2014 and was replaced by former Cambridge United goalkeeper Dean Greygoose.

Huge progress was made under Dean's guidance and 2015/2016 season saw the team win the Eastern Counties League Challenge Cup for the first time with a 2-1 victory over Norwich United. In 2016/2017 the league and cup double were achieved as Newmarket Town were defeated in the League Cup final, and the league title was won by the clear margin of 9 points, thus enabling promotion to the Isthmian League.

For different reasons, both Chairman Martin Tuck and Manager Dean Greygoose vacated their positions in December 2018, following an infamous home defeat to Brentwood. Bill Flynn has stepped up to take over as Chairman of the club whilst former players Ricky Cornish and Colin Vowden were been appointed as Manager & Assistant respectively.

Relegation from the Isthmian League after two seasons saw a return to the Eastern Counties League at Step 5 for season 2019/2020.

The Covid shutdowns disrupted the teams' efforts to return to step 4, but the lull in proceedings did allow the club to upgrade the stadium with a clubhouse refurbishment and the addition of a new hospitality suite, named after Martin Law, an absolute club legend, who very sadly passed away after suffering from MND.

Ricky Cornish was replaced as manager by Phil Weavers, who became Player manager in April 2022. After finishing a respectable 6th in Phil's first full season 2022/23, the addition of some experienced players, as well as the return of club favourites Ben Nolan and Jarid Robson, for the 2023/4 season transformed the team, and the Hall ran away with the title, winning by 14 clear points and only conceding 16 goals throughout the season, ensuring the return to the Isthmian league for 2024/25 season, after a break of 5 years.

The latest development is the installation of LED floodlights in Aug 2024, replacing the old lights that had served the club well for 29 seasons, but had become obsolete, as well as irreparable. Hopefully, this is a portent of a bright new future.

Outstanding players in recent seasons include Mat Mitchel-King, who after being sold by 'Hall to Histon in 2005, progressed into the Football League playing for Crewe Alexandra, and more recently, AFC Wimbledon. Local legend John Sands took the Eastern Counties League by storm during his time with the club, scoring a club record 31 league goals in 2010/2011 and earning himself a transfer to Bury Town. Sands' record lasted only one season however, as Andrew Wood won the coveted League Golden Boot in 2011/2012 scoring a club record of 33 league goals. Two other club legends, both still playing, are Luke Butcher who has captained the team for 10 years, and Josh Pope, who made is debut as an 18-year-old youth player, and now

has well over 600 first tam appearances, notwithstanding a five-year spell at Soham. Two outstanding footballers, who have been the bedrock of the club's success over the last 15 years.

Finally, the club has at last begun to develop a coherent youth section which will hopefully bode well for the future, and allow the club to continue its path of gradual sustainable progression.

DARRYL COAKLEY

Former pro at Cambridge United who is in his second spell with the club. The former Needham Market and AFC Sudbury left-back provides plenty of attacking threat with his crosses into the box. Has stepped up to be part of Weaves' coaching staff this season.

NIKETA CARTNER

Another important member of the backroom

team. 'Keets' has been the club physio for a number of years now.

JOSH POPE

A real favourite of the supporters who returned between our posts in the summer of 2021 after a few seasons with Soham. Popey has made more than 600 appearances for the club at a variety of levels and you could probably count the number of mistakes he's made on one hand.

LUKE BUTCHER

Since joining the club in 2015, Butch has led by example as captain. Rarely loses out in a tackle or in the air, and can also pose a goal threat at the other end of the pitch. Skippered the team to a second league title last season.

JOSH COLLINS

A left-footed centre-back that joined the club during the summer from Long Melford, for whom he made more than 100 appearances. Will offer plenty of physicality and can also be a threat in the opposition's box.

ADAM CAPEL

Arrived in the summer of 2021 after picking up a couple of awards at Ely City's end-of-season event. 'Capes' actually played a friendly for us a few years ago before joining Cambridge City. Good on the ball and never shirks a tackle.

JON KAYE

Crossed the Cambridgeshire/Suffolk divide during the summer of 2023 after skippering our neighbours Soham. A combative midfielder that provides plenty of energy and drive from the middle of the pitch. Scored some key goals last season.

ALFIE CONNOR

Signed for the club midway through the 2022/23 season from Soham. Another all-action midfielder with an eye-catching delivery from set-pieces.

CALLUM ANDERSON

Callum can play anywhere across the midfield. Rose through the ranks at Colchester United before playing for Haverhill Rovers, Maldon & Tiptree and most recently St Neots Town, where he was captain.

Showed last season that he has lost none of his work-rate, commitment and keen eye for goal during his time away from the club at Bury Town, Royston Town and Cambridge City. Was leading scorer last term, finding the net on 21 occasions.

JAKE CHAMBERS-SHAW

A playmaker that returned to the club midway through last season. Spent several seasons with Bury Town and away travelling before rejoining. Has that ability to unlock the tightest of defences.



BEN NOLAN

'Marathon Man' Ben made a welcome return to the club last summer from Cambridge City. He spent much of the campaign playing at right-back but that did not stop him from getting forward and contributing 10 goals.

KIERAN TWINN

Twinny joined us in the summer of 2021 from Walsham-le-Willows. Naturally left footed, he provides some good balance to the attack and is always posing a goal threat.

THE STALINGRAD OF FOOTBALL

'Nobody wants to see scenes like this' say commentators whenever players lose their temper a little, trying to shy away from the idea that, to many in the stands, the shackles coming off of their players' passion is exactly what they want to see. It's usually handbags, a little pushing, some heated words, and then everyone gets back on with the game. But it excites the crowd, speaking to the tribal nature of the sport. Sometimes, however, the heated words spill over into genuine violence, the kind that we genuinely don't want in the game. Never has that been worse than on 17th March 1971, which saw 19 red cards.



The location of this battle, unsurprisingly to those who know, was South America. The passion with which the game is played on that continent surpasses most of what we see in Europe, and the Copa Libertadores - South America's premier club competition - simply inflames those passions even more. When Sporting Cristal won the Peruvian championship, they went into the competition carrying the hopes of their nation, along with close rivals Universitario. Both sides were drawn in a group against Argentinian opposition; Rosario Central, who had lost the championship final the previous season, and Boca Juniors, who had bested them.

The Copa Libertadores group was close after three matchdays, with only two points separating 1st from 4th. Cristal had defeated Boca in Peru, and when Rosario and Universitario drew the group opened up and revenge was on the Argentinians' minds. Despite Cristal picking the same side, the Boca plan, for most of the game, seemed to be working.

Jorge Coch gave the hosts a first half lead after pouncing on a rebound, and Angel Clemente Rojas doubled the advantage, before with just about 70 minutes on the clock, Cristal clicked into gear. This was one of the first matches from abroad to be broadcast live on Peruvian television, so they had to give their fans at home something to get excited about. Juan Orbegoso halved the deficit with a drilled shot from inside the box, before Boca goalkeeper Ruben Sanchez spilled the ball at the feet of Carlos Gonzales Pajuelo, who rolled home an equaliser. The match intensified, and became end to end, as both sides went desperately in search of a winner.

In the dying minutes, Boca broke through the Cristal line. Roberto Rogel, under pressure from the defender, went down in the box. Scythed down, in Boca's minds. Dived, in Cristal's. Crucially, the referee sided with the Peruvians. As a result, the red mist descended on the home side, and one man in particular. In the very next passage of play, Boca's Ruben Sune clattered Alfredo Queseda, and all hell broke loose.

As the referee tried to regain control, Sune made



for the corner flag, taking it out and using it to attack Alberto Gallardo. Gallardo, in retaliation, launched a flying kick at Sune's head. Covered in his own blood, and momentarily stunned, the police took the chance to dive on the Boca captain. It took more than a few to subdue him.

But the incident had caused a riot on the pitch, as both sets of players laid into each other. Cristal's Eloy Campos and Fernando Mellan fell to the floor, where goalscorer Coch planted two kicks; breaking the former's nose, fracturing the latter's skull. Peruvian international Orlando de la Torre took on three Boca players by himself, the level of violence so brutal that it was claimed that it gave his mother a heart attack. She sadly died watching the events on television.

Ruben Sanchez was one of only three players to avoid a dismissal, despite being right at the forefront of the violence. Ramon Mifflin of Cristal did get his marching orders, despite staying relatively uninvolved. The level of chaos was so great, the referee struggled to make sense of it, let alone restore control.

The players involved were sent either to the hospital or the police station. Those arrested were made to spend the night in the cells, and later given 30-day jail sentences (although these were quashed). Boca were thrown out of the competition, and Argentina's hosting of the 1978 World Cup was called into question. Boca's President professed his embarrassment, and requested the harshest possible punishments from the Argentinian FA, who duly obliged. Cristal continued in the competition, but with so many injuries and suspensions from that night, they didn't get far.

The violence was so extreme that it was labelled the Stalingrad of Football, but it was a sad irony that the match was emblematic of what was to come, rather than an aberration. Six months later, the military junta seized power, and the violence on the pitch that night became commonplace across Argentina. But for those who were there, the Bambonerazo became legend.

Enjoy the game.

Our Pitching In Isthmian North sides defeated the weather, so they only had to worry about doing the same to their opponents- and they celebrated by scoring goal after goal.



Leaders **Bury Town** had a three point advantage over second place Witham Town, so would stay top if they could take just one point from visitors **Haringey Borough** - but of course wanted all three, and were overwhelming favourites. The Blues had lost only one of their previous ten, won eight, and were looking for a fifth successive victory; whilst Borough have resembled Dr Jekyll, one win in eight, brilliant one minute and woeful the next, and accordingly rather difficult to predict. They'd perhaps have struggled to predict that they'd fall behind in the very first minute, but that's exactly what happened, Cemal Ramadan scoring his fourteenth of the season to give the Blues a perfect start.

Borough didn't lie down and surrender, and they levelled twenty two minutes from time, Matthew Young keeping his cool from the spot, but with fourteen minutes to go Ollie Canfer restored the Bury lead, and this time, they held it - to open a six point lead at the top of the table. The home fans- pictured- were overjoyed despite the wind and rain.

Second place Witham Town were protecting a seven match unbeaten run as they welcomed Cambridge City, and indeed had won the first six of those. City, meanwhile, had lost four of their previous five, and were quickly behind, Oliver Bell putting the hosts in front on eleven minutes. The visitors levelled in first half added time, George Smith with the equaliser, but within a minute of the second half starting Witham were ahead once more, Shakeel Morris with the goal. Once more City hit back, Aaron Greene levelling seven minutes later, and it really went wrong for the hosts on sixty five minutes. Archie McFadden dismissed and Smith immediately putting City three-two up. Alex Warman made it four-two with nineteen minutes remaining, and six minutes from time the hosts were reduced to nine. Reumu Abutoh also sent off as their unbeaten run unravelled. City are fifteenth, and have the opening of their new ground to look forward to next weekend. We'll have a report from that one, M25 willing.

Felixstowe and Walton United were lucky to escape with a point from Wroxham in midweek, but our third place side had been ruthless on their own patch, and expected that to continue as they welcomed **Brightlingsea Regent**. The Seasiders had previously played fourteen home matches in all competitions, won them all, and scored forty six goals in doing so, which perhaps summed up the size of Regent's challenge. The visitors went ahead, however, Teddy Collis scoring on twenty three minutes, but they were ahead for just three minutes before Josh Hitter levelled. United went ahead on sixty four minutes, Cameron Forde-Brown giving them the lead, but Regent weren't about to surrender and Collis guickly drew them level - and then, with only eleven minutes left, an own goal put the visitors ahead once more? Could they hold on? They'd have to do it with ten men, as substitute lake Clowsley was dismissed only five minutes after coming on, but it looked like they'd take a famous victoryonly for losh Hitter to equalise four minutes into added time. The Seasiders are third, nine points behind the leaders with two games in hand. Regent will be rather disappointed, but are three unbeaten under their new boss and outside the top five only on goal difference.



Fourth place **Tilbury** made the trip to **Waltham Abbey**, but they'll probably wish they hadn't bothered. The Dockers had gone two league matches without a win, which had seen them fall to eight points behind the leaders with one game in hand. Their hosts were eight points and three places further back, and hoping to get back to winning ways after three matches which had brought two draws and a defeat.

Tilbury hammered the Abbotts four-one at the end of September, so the home crowd were hoping for a little revenge, and they'd have been delighted by the first half, as their side charged into a three-nil lead, two goals from Prince Domafriyie, his eighth and ninth of the season, followed by a goal from Nicholas Brown - all three goals coming during a twelve minute purple patch. They weren't done, and got another in first half added time, Nicholas Brown making it four-nil.

Into the second half, and whilst Tilbury have been good at coming from behind this season they weren't going to manage it from five-nil down, and the fifth arrived on sixty three minutes, Luke Deslandes the scorer of that one. Eight minutes later it was six-nil, Kymani Thomas getting in on the act, but the Dockers then finally got going, Sam Bantick pulling a goal back- his eleventh of the season. A minute from time Lindell Stewart added a second for the visitors, but the Abbotts weren't finished, and in added time Thomas scored again to make the final score SEVEN-two.

Grays Athletic had the best defence in the League at kick off. Thirteen games before this weekend had seen only eight goals conceded, they welcomed Wroxham to Chadfields hoping to hold onto their place in the top five and narrow the gap on the sides above them-but they started the match by conceding a rare goal, the Yachtsmen going ahead on fourteen minutes, Ryan Miles the scorer. That started a rather incredible first half, as Athletic levelled and went ahead - Alejandro Machado and Michael Finneran with the goalsonly for the visitors to roar back and reestablish their supremacy, Ryan Hawkins and Harvey Peters taking them from two-one down to three-two up! The visitors added a fourth ten minutes into the second half, Hawkins scoring from the spot, and that Athletic defensive record truly departed when Ollie Sutton made it five with a quarter of an hour left- Sid Walker sent off for the hosts. Wroxham are up to nineteenth. Athletic down to seventh.

Eighth place Basildon **United** travelled to **Mildenhall Town**, trying to end a poor run which had seen them lose five of their last six. Hall hadn't been too much better, taking five points from their last six matches, but they went ahead midway through the first half, Ryan Swift keeping his cool from the spot. The Bees levelled nine minutes into the second half, Kye Jude with the equaliser, but seven minutes from time Ben Nolan got a home winner. Hall are sixteenth, the Bees down to twelfth. **Heybridge Swifts** travelled to Sporting Bengal United hoping to get last weekend's hammering against Grays quickly out of their system. Swifts have been better on the road than on their own patch this season, and they made the breakthrough on thirteen minutes, Eddie Carrington-Alberdi opening the scoring. The lead lasted until the hour, Rian Patel levelling for United, but three minutes from time Andy Fennell made it two-one to the visitors seven minutes after emerging from the bench, and they held on for three points, climbing to eighth.

Trophy heroes **Brentwood Town** were home to **Gorleston**. The Blues started the day four points away from the top five, albeit with games in hand over all of the sides ahead of them, but their league form over the last ten matches had resembled a Margherita pizza with added green pepper, four wins, four defeats and two draws- and they needed to bringing their cup game into the League. After a goalless first half they went ahead within three minutes of the restart, Kai Brown the scorer- and Brown quickly made it two on the hour. Daniel Ogunleye's fourteenth of the season made it three-nil, and Brown had a hat trick seven minutes from time, making it four-nil. The Blues are ninth.

Walthamstow welcomed Newmarket Town

to East London, eleventh v twentieth. Stow were looking to go five unbeaten, whilst the lockeys got their first win in seven when hitting Cambridge City for four in midweek and then saw two of their attackers depart. Those departures didn't seem to matter too much in the opening stages, as Ally Conway put the visitors ahead after only eight minutes, but Stow were soon level, Ali Njie taking only two minutes to draw them level. On thirty four minutes the hosts went ahead, Bilal Sayoud the scorer, and just after the hour Sayoud added a third. It was four-one six minutes from time, Tayo Oyebola making sure of victory, and the scoring didn't end there, Stan Leech pulling it back to four-two in the seventh added minute only for Tayo Oyebola to get a fifth for the hosts and complete a fine double over these opponents and climb to tenth.

Redbridge knew that their 3G pitch would be ready for the visit of **Ipswich Wanderers**, the

visitors under new management and hoping to begin closing the six point gap between themselves and safety. Wanderers had lost their previous four, and had gone ten league matches without a win, whilst the Motormen had only two wins from ten-but only three defeats, having become something of draw specialists on the road. Redbridge went ahead after just eight minutes, Joseph Elliott with the opener, but Wanderers quickly hit back, two of their new arrivals conducting the turnaround, Rhys Henry levelling on twenty eight minutes and Teon Leggett putting them ahead from the spot four minutes later. The Motormen equalised nine minutes after the break, Tendi Quamina taking his tally for the season up to nine in eighteen matches, and then they went ahead, Mekael Williams with the fifth goal of the afternoon and a third for the hosts. The sixth goal wasn't long in coming, and again it went to the Motormen, Malachi Napa the scorer, and three minutes into added time a Charlie Stimson spot kick made it five-two. Redbridge are eleventh, Wanderers are eight points from safety.

Maldon and Tiptree had won their previous two matches, a new manager bounce bouncing them up to seventeenth. The Jammers hosted a Concord Rangers side three points and three places better off, the Beachboys having got back to winning ways last weekend after a six match winless run. They'd already defeated the lammers three-nil this season, and they were guickly ahead in this one, Billy Knott scoring for the visitors after just six minutes, but the hosts were level nine minutes into the second half. Sammy Kuffour the scorer. They weren't level for long, however, Tommy Stagg guickly making it two-one to the visitors, and that looked to have won the match but it hadn't, as six minutes into added time Jack Manly found a last-gasp leveller.

TUESDAY 26TH NOVEMBER

Grays Athletic went into Saturday with the best defensive record in the League, and ended the day on the end of a five-two defeat. They hoped to bounce back, but had what looked like a

difficult task, travelling to in-form **Brentwood Town**, the hosts also desperate for points as they tried to narrow the gap on the top five. Athletic went ahead after just six minutes, Danny Gould scoring his first of the season- and he must have enjoyed it, as he did it again just after the half hour to make it two-nil. Just before the hour the visitors added a third, Alejandro Machado with that one, and the torture wasn't over for the hosts. Eight minutes from time Elliott Sartorius made it four, two minutes later Louie Remi scored a fifth, and a Kai Brown goal for Town with four minutes to go really didn't help the home fans to feel any better about their evening.

Maldon and Tiptree's new boss Brett Munyard might have struggled to remember which changing room to enter, as the Jammers, unbeaten under this leadership, travelled to face his former club, Brightlingsea Regent - also unbeaten under their new boss. Samuel Kuffour put the visitors ahead midway through the first half, only for Regent to level midway through the second, Louie Kudiabor with the equaliser.
