Hi everyone, and welcome to the latest instalment of our away day reviews, a new feature in this seasons Seasiders match day programme. Bringing you the highs and lows of the "Away Day" experience following our club Felixstowe & Walton Utdaround the country.

When the fixtures were released in July, all eyes were naturally drawn to the opening day opponents, the Christmas & New Year schedule, Easter and the run in. But another date of interest was the August Bank Holiday fixture, and you will not have heard many groans when we learnt that we were given a trip to the Norfolk seaside resort of Great Yarmouth to face the currently nomadic Gorleston FC, very much the divisions form side.

Bank Holiday fixtures always throw up logistical challenges for those using public transport and it was therefore a welcome bit of news when the club announced a week or so earlier that the game had been brought forward to a 1pm kick-off.

Spirits were a little low after an early exit from The Emirates FA Cup and a 0-0 draw with Bowers and Pitsea in the few days before, leaving The



Seasiders with 4 points from our opening 3 league fixtures. Only 2 league goals scored was a worry, but the defence being breached only once meant that the glass was half full and not that horrible half empty variety.

Due to the early kick-off and Bank Holiday football vying for attention with other attractions, it was perhaps not too surprising that only two hardy souls (the other being Marc "Lorro" my thus-far ever-present partner in crime this season)

were on platform 1 at Felixstowe International Station when the 07:47 train pulled in. We were aware that others had made alternative plans and that all roads led to The Wellesley Road sports ground.

Mitch joined us at Ipswich and as we queued at Greggs for a coffee I noticed The Invisible Man was also travelling with Greater Anglia that day. Either that or someone decided they no longer liked their choice of footwear and just left them. Mistley John had boarded at Manningtree, so our numbers had already doubled as the 08:38 train to Norwich left on time. It was shortly after that we received a photo of Stevie Isaacs already at Norwich station. Now that's commitment, or insomnia......

Anyone that has taken the train to Great Yarmouth will agree that it is a very easy and scenic route, calling at such delightful locations as Brundall Gardens, Lingwood and Acle, and in next to no time we were in the "Vegas of the East" and nearly seeing a lady mown down by a motorist that clearly does not understand their highway code obligations when approaching a zebra crossing.

had been handed to me for safe keeping was our club photographer Stefan Peck setting up his equipment behind the goal he was hoping we would attack first half. I rubbed my eyes to get better focus from the blinding light of the outdoors and there, in all it's glory, stood the very aged and rusty looking beauty that is known to football fans throughout East Anglia. And just to the left of Stef was the grandstand.

We had a quick comfort break and refuel in the clubhouse before heading to the west side of the ground, as the entire length of the of this side of the ground is covered, and believe me it was very hot under the early afternoon August sunshine.



The Seasiders were sublime in the opening 45 minutes, and we also had the pleasure of meeting the lovely family of summer recruit Dan Gilchrist in that half. Mrs Dan and the 2 little lasses were very polite about their hero, but wishes he opens his account soon, to stop him moaning all the time at home. Hopefully, I said, he will do so very soon.

At HT we thought it would be good to head over to the other side of ground and were happy to see the safety barriers open allowing access to the behind goal area. We decided to enjoy the better vantage point, whilst keeping a safe distance behind the Olympic sized running track

Just a few days after our Bank Holiday Monday trip to Great Yarmouth to see the lads win away for the first time this season we were on our travels again, this time to deepest darkest Essex. When the fixtures were released, I was not expecting this game to be played on the scheduled date, as I was sure that either F&W or Grays Athletic would be in FA Cup action. However, with both clubs suffering replay defeats 12 days earlier, it was football, and not a blank Saturday, that saw The Seasiders red army assemble at Felixstowe station for the 08:28 train.

I was joined by Lorro, Big Neil, Pete and Isaac. This was a special day for young Isaac, his first away day watching the boys. I had promised his Dad I would look after him (although he is 23 and the Father of 2 young girls) and as someone

later remarked, relying on me to look after someone is like asking Evil Knievel to be a riding instructor.

It was also good to see Kit and Dick on the train. They were heading to Loftus Road for Queens Park Rangers v Charlton Athletic. They had a 12.30 kick-off though due to those pesky fixture pickers at Sky Towers. No such problems for us I am glad to say (at this stage anyway). Kit, Dick and Lorro were regular companions of mine in the 1990s and noughties as we all travelled to London together on a Saturday before going our separate ways, Loftus Road, Highbury and, in my case, The Dell, so the day started with a tremendous throwback feeling to it. Neil had told us 113 times in the previous 3 weeks that there are no pubs in Tilbury these days, so we gladly ended our journey one stop early, and



headed off into Grays town centre for a totally free of charge horrible histories tour. Neil proudly showed us the picture house he took his lovely late wife to on their first date (think he said it was a silent movie, but they all were in them days)

We were also told of all the pubs that once stood proudly, but are now job centres, nail bars or estate agents. One could see the tears in his eyes welling up, so we decided to find a pub that was still alive and kicking. The Courtyard was iust that establishment. 11.15am, and already it was busy, and a proper spit and sawdust boozer. Only wet sales here. I loved it. After an hour or so Neil frog-marched us on another tour of old haunts as we crossed the railway line and headed to The Theobold Arms. Thankfully, the beer was good, and the girl behind the bar was very chatty.

Time was ticking on, and we headed back to the station to get a train to Tilbury, but not before Neil found another building that was once a regular Friday night stop for him, The Rising Sun. Naturally this led to the first of many renditions of The Animals classic of the same name. There is a house in old Grays Town, they call the Rising Sun. and it's been the ruin of many a poor boy, dear God, we know, he's one!!!!!!

A taxi rank was perfectly positioned outside the station (I know, best place for them) and a 7-seater was handily placed. Collectively all 5 of us remembered how cabbies lost a lot of earnings during the pandemic, so we did our bit and jumped in. Taxi for Chadfields please driver. Even then, the history lesson continued, as we went past the house the newlyweds first moved in to after their wedding. Upon arrival, Isaac paid the man and we headed for the turnstiles.

Grays FC always has a wonderful community spirit about it. The gazebo just inside the gates is always well manned by their amazing volunteers and a good range of merchandise is available, as well as the obligatory raffle tickets and other fundraisers. A true football club, 100% fan owned, and a joy to visit. I believe they now have the keys to Ship Lane, so hopefully within the next 18-24 months they may well have somewhere to call home once again. Back-to-back FA Trophy successes in the mid 2000s shows the calibre of club they are.



We found Mistley John in the clubhouse, having driven down today, as well as a fair number of travelling seasiders that had enjoyed the coach journey down. Or should that say endured? Several fans told us that the coach had a rather unsavoury aroma, possibly emanating from the rest room, and by all accounts the smell was circulating through the air vents. Doubtless the

coach company will learn from this and the situation will not arise again in the future, but I was thankful I was once again making my own independent travel arrangements.



Chadfields, the home of The Dockers and Grays, is a wonderful old football ground. A well-appointed clubhouse behind the near goal and a decent terrace behind the other, from which looking right you can clearly see the cranes of the Port of Tilbury. It is like being back home, albeit on a far smaller scale. There is covered terracing and seats along the far touchline, and a marvellous old grandstand on the near side. But the jewel in the crown of this old place is Eat Street, the renowned food stall situated between the gazebo and grandstand. Regularly voted as the best footie scran in our league, no visit to Chadfields is complete without some top quality grub to keep the energy levels up.



The game itself was a masterclass in how to win a game of football away from home. The back line was as solid as ever, the midfield dominated and controlled the game, and up

front we looked dangerous. A 0-3 scoreline did not flatter us, we were certainly 3 goals better on the day, and it is evident our hosts need to find a goalscorer and quickly. I expect them to be a tougher nut to crack when we meet again on the last Saturday before Christmas.

At full time we retreated back to the clubhouse to chew the fat (not from Eat Street I must add) and have a couple of beers for the road. It was a rather slow and tame walk back to Tilbury station before embarking on our return journey, once again via Barking and Stratford. As day turned to night and we made our way home I could not help but think about the coach travellers. I was hoping that the return leg was less obnoxious for them than the outward.

We arrived back in Felixstowe just before 21:30. Isaac and Lorro headed home whilst Big Neil and Pete joined me for a night cap in Harrys Bar.



Another great day out, and 2 superb away wins in the space of 5 days has really given our season momentum after a couple of early blips. The lads sit in 3rd place in the league and we can turn our focus to the FA Trophy campaign. Mistley John and Big Neil were already there, eating the lovely food laid on in the clubhouse (why did I not remember this fact?.....)

Most of the talk as we waited patiently for the driver to finish his pre-drive meal was about the

journey to the Grays match the previous week by the regular coach passengers. Thankfully whatever issues they had then were not evident today, and a lovely journey was had by all. It was great to see a sold-out coach, and that is testimony to the dedication of the regular away supporters.

Once in Hertford we went on a short detour in the opposite direction to the ground and a reverse around a blind corner, no mean feat in a vehicle of that size. But that did mean we approached the car park from the wrong direction so it was not possible for the coach to turn sharp left so we disembarked on the side of the main road. Whilst most headed to the ground around 8 of us went in the opposite direction to the very quaint and welcoming Black Horse Public House. Although quite a dark bar inside, there was a tiny staircase that led up to a lovely spacious beer garden. If you did not know it was there it was easy to miss it. I have no idea if this is usual for Hertford home games or if they were short-staffed, but it did take an age to get to the head of the queue. Thankfully there was a large window at the front so we were able to see some of the game going on and it's always nice to berate a lino for a raised flag when you can't even see the incident.

Our hosts had started the season in magnificent form and boasted a 100% record in all competitions heading into this match. I would imagine they were quietly confident of progress,







but in all honesty, F&W were better in every single department. From the moment Sam Ford put us ahead there was only one team winning this game of football. We even made it interesting by gifting them an equaliser, but it was as close to a routine victory as you're likely to see.

Hat-trick hero Sam Ford was replaced during the 2nd half but left via the usual route, however young Ethan Garcia made the right choice and walked around the pitch to try the local brew...

Towards the end of the game some of us were getting homesick, and so we made an offer to Shaun that he could not refuse. Give us a lift back to Felixstowe and we will, well nothing, just give us a lift back. # **OUR SQUAD**

been prolific at Step 4 and 5 with an impressive spell at Stowmarket yielding 136 goals in 173 games. Josh's physical presence brings a focal point to our attack as well as a being natural finisher who is a proven goalscorer at this level.

### **Zak Brown**

A sought after and highly rated young striker with blistering pace and a great goal scoring record. At just 17, Zak penned a two year pro contract with ITFC where he was a regular marksman in the U23's. Zak started life in the Seasiders Youth sections and has returned to lead the forward line as the clubs No. 9.



### **Dan Gilchrist**

Dan's non league career started at Canvey Island before relocating to Suffolk where he went onto play for AFC Sudbury in the FA Cup 1st round, before moving onto Bury Town and Thetford where he had two impressive goalscoring seasons. A hard working attacking player with an eye for goal.

### Ollie Canfer

Canfs returns to the club after 2 season away, gaining promotion with Bury Town, previous clubs include Brightlingsea and Mildenhall. Canfs is a fans favourite after scoring many important goals for the club in his last period with us.

# **Jacob Lay**

Jacob rejoins the club for his second spell, after leaving in 2020, Jacob has gained promotion from step 3 and played at step 2 last season for Needham Market. A tricky winger who has huge energy and workrate.





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# IF you want to see some goals, it looks like Whitley Bay and Retford United are the places to be.

That was certainly the case in July and August. This season we're teaming up with the guys at Non-League HQ - find them on X - to bring monthly stats from across the Pyramid.

It promises to show a snapshot into how teams and players are performing each calendar month. Perhaps the table shows they're struggling but a deeper look may show a team is in fact one of the most in-form sides around.

Our first instalment shows Whitley Bay scored 27 times in the opening period of the season as did Retford at Step 6 - although Cranfield are just a goal behind them. Of course Steps 1-4 started a little after Steps 5 and 6 but it will be fascinating to see how things unfold throughout the campaign.

We'll also be highlighting the players. At the end of August, the top scorer across Non-League football was Zak Khan.

The Route One Rovers man hit 13 goals including three hat-tricks for the Northern Counties East League Division One side.

He was a closely followed by Alnwick's Euan Potts and Step 5's leading scorer from Penrith, Luke Hunter, who both ended August on 12. Potts has also grabbed two trebles, while Hunter led the way when it comes to consecutive games he scored in with nine. The closest player to that sequence is Oxhey Jets' James Barnett with six games on the spin.

At Steps 1 to 4 - having not played as many games - National League North duo Michael Gyasi, the King's Lynn Town striker, and Scarborough Athletic's Stephen Walker were the most profitable in the opening month with seven goals each.

The stats will focus on different areas throughout the season but we can't wait to see how the Golden Boot races unfold.

And who knows where these goal getters might end up. In last week's NLP, Tony Incenzo spoke to QPR's new signing Richard Kone.

It seems incredible the striker, who the Hoops recently signed from Wycombe Wanderers, was playing for Athletic Newham in the Essex Senior League a couple of years ago.

The 22-year-old scored 125 goals for the Non-Leaguers while visa issues were sorted to allow him to move into the full-time game.

"I was playing against tough men week in, week out," he said. "It helped me discover how to overcome physical defenders."

His rapid rise will be a real inspiration to so many. After all, goals pay the bills. And they also help draw in the crowds! Whitley Bay and Retford are certainly on our ones to watch in September!

# THE OTHER SIDE: **NEWMARKET TOWN**

### **HISTORY**

The Star Hotel on the High Street on the corner with Sun Lane (presently Pizza Express) was the venue on Thursday 22 November 1877 of a meeting of football interests in the town. Newmarket Town Football Club was formed thus making them one of the oldest clubs in the country.

Under the presidency of Mr BT Chennel, Mr FG Postans informed the meeting that subscriptions of nearly £25 had already been collected. Flags, posts and all articles necessary for the game were on order. Players were to be supplied with a suitable uniform at half price.

The first committee was elected as follows:

**President:** Mr BT Chennel **Secretary:** Mr FG Postans

Assistant Secretary: Mr A Hayhoe

Treasurer: Mr FR Crick

Committee Members: Mr CE Hammond, Mr AS Manning, Mr E Fyson, Mr H Feist, Mr H Palmer, Mr A Pace, Mr C Kemp, Mr T Browne, Mr W Moody, Mr CB Bosworth and Mr R Jacobs

It was further resolved that the headquarters would be at the Star Hotel and annual subscription would be five shillings (25p). The first practice was to be on the Severals on the afternoon of the following Thursday. Following on, a practice field was lent my Mr Norman Wiseman, and funds became available to purchase a tent in December.

The first match took place on the Severals (with the permission of the Jockey Club) on 1 February 1877 but Newmarket were beaten 3-0 by Pembroke College. They began life in local football on a pitch on the Heath near Sefton Lodge until moving to the present Town Ground in 1885. Few clubs have managed to stay at the same ground for 127 years. Initially the ground was shared with the Cricket Club, the Quoit Club, the Athletic Club, the Gun Club and the Hare and Hounds Club, a real sports centre!

The inaugural game on the new ground was on Wednesday 21 October 1885 Newmarket Town and Bury School. For obvious reasons they soon became known as the Jockeys. Little success came until 1920 when they won the Cambs Senior League and also the Cambs Senior Cup. The Cambs Challenge was won in 1926. Moving into the Bury and District League resulted in them winning the title in three consecutive seasons, 1931-32, 1932-33 and 1933-34 and the Suffolk Senior Cup in the season 1934-35. Around this time crowds of 2000 or more were seen at major games.

Wartime matches even saw International Players such as Stan Mortensen 'guesting' for the Jockeys.

The club had good times in these earlier days, even to the extent of forming an 'A' side that had its own share of success before fortunes changed for the worse. Following the war, the club finished bottom for five consecutive seasons, and by the end of the 1951-52 campaign, they again found themselves rooted at the bottom of the ECL, having lost all 34 league games, scoring 19 goals whilst 171 against, a claim to fame that will take some beating. Forced to return to Junior football the club joined the Peterborough and District League in 1959-60. Their best season was runners tup to Lowestoft in 1966-67. League honours having been elusive they have in recent years won the Suffolk Premier Cup four times in the five seasons to 1999.

The present clubhouse was completed, and floodlights were installed in 1985. The first league game under lights being against Ely City on 19 November. The old wooden stand was replaced by the present 144-seater stand in 1996.

In 2004-05 Newmarket Town Ladies was formed, although they disbanded after the 2008-09 season, they reformed for the 2014-15 season. Since then, the Ladies Division has grown from strength to strength and now features a first team, development side and an under 18 team. 2024-25 saw all sides finishing in their highest ever league positions. The Development side won the clubs first senior trophy in 10 years beating Leverington Ladies 2-1 in the County League Cup Final.

2013-14 season saw the Jockeys victorious in the Thurlow Nunn League cup final, beating Felixstowe and Walton 2-1 at Diss.

2016 saw a huge ground upgrade with the installation of a FIFA certified cork infill 3G pitch and energy efficient LED floodlights.

In 2023-24 the club, having finished in second place achieved promotion from the Thurlow Nunn Premier Division via a 2-0 play off victory against Mulbarton Wanderers. The game was played out in front of a 930 strong crowd. Newmarket Town were promoted to step four for the first time in their history and were placed in the Isthmian North League.



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

# THE CLUB THAT REFUSED TO DIE

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Lots of us have been there. We can endure any defeat, any relegation. Any amount of utter bilge on the pitch, any amount of uninspiring blandness, and amount of sideways and backwards passes. We're football fans, after all. It's what we signed up for. But when our clubs themselves are under threat, it becomes a different matter. So imagine what it would be like to not just lose your club, stolen by self-interested owners with little regard for history and tradition, but to watch the club that replaces yours go on to become the biggest, richest, most powerful club in the country. Heartbreaking, and it's exactly what happened in Salzburg.

Austria Salzburg might not have been the biggest club in the Alps, but at the turn of the century they had a long history, with recent success. They won the Austrian Bundesliga three times in the 1990s, and the Austrian Supercup each time as well. In 1994 they reached the final of the UEFA Cup, losing 2-0 to Inter. For a club from a nation not considered a powerhouse since the 1930s, it was an impressive achievement. And yet as the new millennium dawned, financial troubles began to plague them. So when Dietrich Mateschnitz offered some investment, it was welcomed.

Austrian sports aren't so precious about their names as some. Clubs often change their names to accommodate a major sponsor, while

maintaining their identity and traditions. So many fans might have expected the words 'Red Bull' to appear somewhere in their name, for a while. It would be worth it, to keep the Violette in business. Except, Violette (purple-whites) was the last thing on Mateschnitz mind. He had a goal, his drinks brand at the very top of European football, and his investment would be worthless to him if it didn't benefit the corporate company. The kit's colours were changed to red and white. The badge was changed to incorporate the Red Bull logo. And he tried to claim that it was a new club, with a history beginning in 2005. Tradition, gone.

There was a split among the fanbase. Some embraced the changes - it was still their club - but others rebelled. On-pitch protests, pressure groups, letters to the Austrian FA, everything was tried to keep Austria Salzburg alive. But it didn't work, and Red Bull Salzburg invested heavily to become the strongest club in the country. Embittered fans were abandoned, and then they took lessons from England. Following the angry fans of Wimbledon and Manchester United, they grouped together, and formed a phoenix club.

With the support of a large following and prominent Austrian footballers, as well as every other Austrian Bundesliga club and many across Europe (and even two in the USA), Salzburg fans began the long, slow fight against modern football.

At first, they were able to join with another club to play in the third division, but when that arrangement fell apart, they were relegated into amateur football, all the way to the seventh tier.

So, in 2006, Austria Salzburg relaunched as a fully independent club. A new squad, some of whom were fans, were quick to make an impression. They won four league titles in a row, returning to the third tier as quickly as possible. They also found themselves a new permanent home, the Max Aicher Stadion. It's tiny, just a capacity of 1500, but it's home. And it's ten minutes from the renamed Red Bull Arena where so many grew up watching their team. (That stadium, by contrast, now holds 30,000 fans).

If the first decade of the reformed club was a run of success, the second decade had been mixed. Financial troubles saw them slip back down the league, relegated with a points deduction. They were able to return to the third tier after a couple of years, stabilising at that level and clearing

their debts. In 2023, Austria Salzburg announced that they were debt free.

And fate rewarded them. In the Austrian Cup, for the first time, they were drawn with Red Bull. The game was played outside the city for fear of fan trouble, and drew fans from across Europe. The now-giants won 4-0, but it was a marker for the Violette; they were back.

In 2024, they won the third tier, but were denied promotion due to a substandard infrastructure. But this is a club that's used to fighting back. They didn't sulk. They fixed the problems, and won the league again. This season, they compete in the 2. Bundesliga, the division below Red Bull. Tiny stadium, long history, passionate fanbase. It won't be easy, it might not be quick, but the message to the drinks company is clear.

Austria Salzburg are coming.

Enjoy the game.
