I'm sure all those who made the trip will agree - if you were going to build and design a new non-league football ground with the opportunity to progress, Cambridge City would be the model. From the floodlit 3G pitch, a second soon-to-be floodlit grass pitch, and an incredible main stadium - in my opinion, it more than covers all bases. The design caters both to current needs and future growth, ensuring it will remain nothing short of first-class. A quick mention must go to all the Cambridge staff and board members, who were the most friendly and welcoming - many thanks to them.

Since our last game at home we've been on the road for two away fixtures. The first of those was a Suffolk Premier Cup clash against AFC Sudbury, where we came away with a very pleasing 3–2 victory.

We started the game really brightly and managed to score at crucial moments in the match, we withstood Cambridge's pressure and thanks to some excellent saves from Harry, we stayed in the game until Toby sealed the win with a great free kick, helping us bring all three points back to Felixstowe.

Today's game is the first of four consecutive home matches for us, each one will bring its own challenges, but we're focused on taking it one game at a time

Not many people know this...

I was sitting in the stand at the last home game which ended all square with neither side able to break down the opposing defence, it was the second time we have played out a goal-less draw at the Martello Ground this season.

One of the people sitting in close proximity was the match sponsor and as the game progressed, I began to wonder who they would select for MotM. My view was leaning towards one of our central defenders who had been solid throughout, restricting the visitors to just one real chance which Harry Wright somehow got a hand to, keeping the score level. Then, he did it again, late on in the second half, somehow turning away a goal bound shot with an acrobatic save that secured a point from a game we should have on the basis of chances created, won

comfortably, but thankfully due to Harry's prowess we settled for a share of the points and he deservedly got MotM.

I decided to check Harry's record for us between the sticks last season. He played every minute of every game in every competition we entered, a total of 56 games or 5,040 minutes. In 17 of those games (30.35%) he kept a clean sheet and in a further 21 games (37.5%) conceded a single goal and in just 32.14% he conceded more than one goal.

In 84 hours between the posts he conceded 66 goals at a rate, on average, of ONE every 1 Hour 16 minutes. Now that is some record!

Clean sheets this season so far.... Just 8 in 16 games!!!!!

I CAN'T have been the only one to notice a distinct change in the temperature over the last few weeks as the summer months passed and autumn set in.

The autumn and winter months can be difficult periods for Non-League clubs up and down the country. Storm Amy battered our shores and played havoc with the fixture scheduled a fortnight ago, while the likes of Bram, Chandra, Dave and Eddie brewing for the next instalment.

Indeed, echoes of past storms and multiple postponements that wiped out week-after-week of fixtures sprung to mind as I ventured to a Friday night fixture between Northern League Division One rivals Newcastle Blue Star and Horden Community Welfare a couple of weeks back.

Now, I can't have been the only one expected to arrive at Blue Star's KD Stadium to be told the fixture had fallen foul of the strong winds and heavy rainfall that had battered the north-east and beyond for large parts of the previous 24 hours.

Yet, to my surprise, it was very much business as usual as the two sides made their way out onto a playing surface which looked in pristine condition despite being battered in the hours leading up to the game.

Somehow, amidst howling wind and driving rain, an intriguing contest ensued with the points shared in a 1-1 draw.

Indeed, on reflection, a share of the spoils was quite fitting on a day where the real winners

were the team of Blue Star volunteers who worked tirelessly, without any individual reward, to get the game on in testing conditions.

But it wasn't just the ground staff at Scotswood who deserve credit.

Off the pitch, turnstiles were in use, pints were being pulled in the clubhouse, bins were being emptied, half-time draw tickets sold and the club shop manned.

Then, once the full-time whistle had been blown, the clean-up operation began, both in and outside of the stadium – tasks that the 243 in attendance wouldn't have given a second thought to.

This, of course, is indicative of everyday life at a Non-League club, whatever the level, and got me thinking just how invaluable volunteers are to the day-to-day running of our clubs and how they provide the foundations of their very existence.

Without them, there would be no football clubs, or if we did, they would be unrecognisable from what we can consider ourselves fortunate to have.

From the tea lady to the kitman, the bar staff, to those manning the turnstiles and sweeping up post-match - all are as essential as each other and deserve our utmost respect and appreciation.

Their work may go unnoticed, and they may well toil away with unseen hours of graft, but they remain as essential as those representing our clubs on the pitch and the management teams that guide them.

The winter months, as always, will be significant challenges as the bad weather descends - and that is when our volunteers come to the fore and go beyond the call of duty.

Their work is invaluable, whatever the weather.





DANUBIAN DREAMS

Britain rightly claims to have been the birthplace of football, and to have exported the world's most popular sport across the globe as its trading empire and influence spread. But the British game was largely a physical, direct affair: long balls and often brutal challenges that belonged on a rugby pitch almost as much as they belonged on a football pitch. The technical game that we love today, passing, movement, and stylish progression up the pitch, took decades to find fertile soil in the UK. Instead, where it would take root and come to influence and define the modern game, was Central Europe. In the first half of the twentieth century, football matured in Austria and Hungary.

In October 1902, the match was part of a long running cultural struggle within the late Austro-Hungarian empire, with Vienna and Budapest as the two main, often uncomfortably twinned, centres of power. Different languages, different cultures, but the same emperor and, in the decades after the match, the same school of football. The match itself demonstrated the differences already emerging between the British game and what would become the Danubian school; learning to play in tiny yards between the buildings rather than on large, open playing fields, both Austria and Hungary's players were adaptable and technical. Right from the start, Austro-Hungarian football was more than just physical exercise. It was an intellectual pursuit, a drive for modernity in Fin de Siecle- era Vienna.

The match itself was a dominant victory for the hosts, with Josef Taurer scoring the very first non-British international goal, followed by Gustav Haber and a hat-trick from Jan Studnicka to see off the Hungarian side 5-0. But the result was less important that what it inspired at home; shortly afterwards, both nations set up formal football associations, and the Danubian school was founded.

The First World War, which should have hindered the development of Central European football, actually proved fortuitous. Englishman Jimmy Hogan was trapped in Austria, unable to return home but largely unthreatening. He was given the freedom to find work, and ended up alongside the legendary Hugo Meisl who was beginning to develop something special. It would take over a decade to come to fruition, but when it did, Austria's Wunderteam might have been the best in the world.

Meisl put together a fluid system that had the great Matthias Sindelar as a focal point, dropping deep and dominating play. The formation was ostensibly a 2-3-5, but adaptable enough that in reality it was a proto-WM, ahead of Herbert Chapman. By the 1930s, Austria were arguably the best team in the world, and the Danubian Whirl was leaving opponents in the dirt. Between 1931 and 1933 they lost just one match, and beat England. Austria were one of the favourites going into the 1934 World Cup, playing dazzling

football and putting their near neighbours Hungary out with ease in the quarter-finals. But against hosts Italy in the semis, in atrocious conditions, they were unable to get their passing game going. Not that Italy were much better. The match was decided by a controversial goal when Austrian keeper Rudi Hiden was pushed into the net, and the referee was accused of favouring the hosts. Perhaps not surprising, with Mussolini watching on.

Austria were denied another shot at the trophy in 1938 after being annexed by Nazi Germany. There was an attempt to put together a Greater Germany side, but a number of Austrian players refused, including Sindelar who died soon after, in suspicious circumstances.

That destruction of the Austrian team allowed the centre of football to shift, from Vienna to Budapest. After the war, Hungary embarked on a spectacular footballing project, under the auspices of the visionary Gustav Sebes. Sebes took the principles laid down by Meisl and Hogan, and with communist centralisation funnelling all

of the talent to one club, he made Honved and Hungary the envies of the footballing world.

Gyula Grosics, Sandor Kocsis, Nandor Hidegkuti, and of course the great Ferenc Puskas built upon what Meisl had done, and turned it into something not just extraordinary, but profoundly modern. Total Football may have been given its name in Amsterdam, but it was developed in Budapest. In Grosics, they even had a sweeperkeeper long before Manuel Neuer earned the moniker. They were poetry in motion, and between 1952 and 1956 they became the first non-British team to beat England in England, as well as thumping them in Hungary, and lost just one match. Unfortunately for this Golden Team, it was the one match that mattered, the 1954 World Cup final.

It took half a century, but the Danubian dream so nearly came to fruition. It died, like so many footballing dreams, at the hands of German ruthlessness.

Enjoy the game.

THE OTHER SIDE MALDON & TIPTREE FC

In the summer of 2010, Maldon Town & Tiptree United amalgamated to form, Maldon & Tiptree Football Club, under the ownership of Ed Garty. As a result of the amalgamation, Tiptree United withdrew from the Essex Senior League. Following the retirement of Colin Wallington, Assistant Manager, Brad King and Glen Knight were appointed as the clubs Joint-Manager. As the pair's first managerial role, the new club witnessed wholesale changes with only a handful of players remaining who finished the season with Maldon Town and Tiptree United.

The 2010-11 campaign saw the new club remain in or around the play-off positions for the majority of the season, finishing in eighth place to finish the season with sixty-three points. The 2011-12 season, proved to not be so successful and in November 2011, King and Knight were relieved of their duties. Ex-Charlton professional Mike Flanagan was appointed as Caretaker Manager and remained in place until the end of the season, steering the club to a respectful mid-table finish, managing thirty-three games.

At the start of the 2012-13 campaign, Ex-Stansted & Redbridge boss Terry Spillane was appointed as Manager, and Mike Flanagan departed the club. Ex Tiptree United manager, Jody was brought to the club as Terry's Assistant Manager. The club found themselves at the top of the table but an incredible run by eventual Champions Grays meant Maldon had to settle for a place in the play-offs. Maldon were defeated in the final after losing two goal lead to draw with Thamesmead Town, who then went on to win on penalties. After a disappointing end to the previous season, Terry Spillane oversaw more wholesale changes in the playing squad, Maldon

finished the 13/14 campaign in ninth position with seventy-six points, winning twenty-one games.

More changes to the playing staff, resulted in poor start to the 2014-15 season, and the club parted ways with Spillane in September 2014, with Chairman, Ed Garty taking over as Caretaker Manager, for three games. At the end of Sep 2014, Alan Kimble was appointed as manager and remained in charge for the remainder of the season, Maldon finished the season in nineteenth place with only forty-nine points.

During the 2014-15 season a vote took place for the clubs new nickname and was featured on National Radio station, TalkSport, with the The Jammers winning the vote with over 50%.

Following the completion of the 2015-16 season, the club linked with Colchester United. David Wright was appointed as Manager, remaining in charge until December 2015 until he was appointed Assistant Manager of Colchester United. Moving into 2016, ex-Leiston Manager, Steve Ball was appointed Manager and steered the club to seventh place, only missing out on the play-off places by nine points. In the off season, Steve Ball joined Colchester as their Assistant Manager, and was replaced by ex-Manchester City midfielder, Kevin Horlock. For the majority of 2016/17, the lammers sat at the top of the table before slipping away to finish in second place. Horlock's side managed to reach the play-off final, however lost to Thurrock one-nil. The following campaign was not quite as successful for Horlock, with Maldon finishing just outside the play-off places in 7th.

After managing 112 games, Kevin Horlock departed in the closed season and was replaced





by ex-Colchester defender, Wayne Brown. In Brown's first season in charge, the 2018-19 season, the Jammers finished in second place and reached the play-off final, but lost on penalties against local rivals, Heybridge Swifts.

The 2019-20 season was one to remember for the club, but for the right and wrong reasons. The club achieved great things in the Emirates FA Cup, reaching the Second Round Proper after being Leyton Orient in the first round. In the 2nd round, Maldon were drawn against Football League side, Newport County with the game being shown live on National Television – with the Jammers only beaten by the League Two side, with a goal in stoppage time, with the game finishing 1-0. A record attendance of 1876 was recorded.

However, the 2019-20 season will also be remembered for the wrong reasons. The Jammers found themselves top of the Isthmian Division One North, thirteen points clear with four games in hand, when Covid-19 arrived, with all results from the season being expunged, and no promotion or relegation taking place to, from, or within the division.

Following the disappointing end to the 2019-20 season, Wayne Brown remained in charge of the club and wholesale changes in the playing squad occurred again, with a number of last season's squad securing transfers to clubs higher up the football pyramid. In October 2020, Ed Garty stood down as Owner, with General Manager, Ron Dangerfield being confirmed as





the new Chairman, with Richard Cowling taking ownership of the football club.

Just like the 2019-20 season, the 2020-21 season was terminated with promotion and relegation denied for all the sides competing in the Division One North. However, prior to the termination the Jammers reached the Emirates FA Cup First Round for the second successive season and achieved their longest ever run in the Buildbase FA Trophy, before losing to Gloucester City. The Jammers were only able to play the five league games

Heading in to the 2021/22 season, Wayne Brown remained in charge of the First Team and is now recorded as the clubs longest serving manager. Midway through the 2021/22 season, Brown was appointed as interim Head Coach at Colchester United, with Paul Abrahams taking over as interim Manager. Abrahams steered the Jammers within touching distance of the play-off semi-finals, however three defeats in the final three games saw the Jammers fall short. At the end of the season, Ron Dangerfield departed and was replaced by Jerry Carter.

In May 2022, Wayne Brown departed on a permanent basis and was appointed as Head Coach at Colchester United, having managed 141 games and a win percentage of 68%. After a positive spell as interim Manager, Paul Abrahams was appointed manager on 17 May 2022.

Over the next couple of seasons, the Jammers experienced a high turnover of managers,

following the appointment of Mitchell Cowling as General Manager and Daniel Barber, as Chairman with both men arrived in October 2022. Abrahams left, Adam Flint was appointed and soon sacked, ex-England manager Peter Taylor handed the reigns and remained in charge until August 2023 before he was sacked by Cowling. Liam Bailey was appointed as Taylor's successor and held his position until the following April before returning to Colchester.

To commence the 2024/25 season, David Huzzey was appointed but departed the club after 19 games to be replaced by Brett Munyard. In similar fashion to his predecessors, Munyard's spell was short lasting only 10 games before being replaced by Bailey, who was once again appointed as interim Head Coach until the end of the 2024/25 season.

the season concluded, Kevin Horlock returned as the Jammers First Team Manager following a successful spell at Needham Market. Horlock guided the club towards a mid-table finish, with plans being put in place for the 2025/26 season.

In preparation for what promises to be a blockbuster season, Maldon & Tiptree's pre-season was a busy one. This year however, there was an extra dimension- Maldon & Tiptree's first ever women's side. Jody Buckley was announced as the first ever Ladies manager, in between a Jammers Academy also being launched. More stadium enhancements were completed throughout the summer, with the Jammers planning for success on and off the pitch in 2025/26.
