Our visitors have made a steady start to the season, sitting in a respectable 9th position, having amassed 24 points to date.

Once again, this is a fixture where the boys will need to remain focused, showing 100% work rate, concentration, and commitment. We've seen it time and time again at this level that, on their day, anyone can compete and take points.



It looked very much that way last week as we visited Walthamstow. However, Cornard huffed and puffed, and a long-range effort that looked to be heading straight to Harry took an extraordinary bobble and ended up in the net, 1–2 at the break.

As the game went on, our fitness and ball retention began to pay dividends as we pushed for a third, which eventually came from the skipper with a close-range header. Semi-final, here we come – one more game and the possibility of a third consecutive final!





I try not to pick out individuals too often, but just a couple of quick mentions: Harry Wright – what can you say? Some of the saves he's made this season have been nothing short of outstanding. His shot-stopping is by far the best I've witnessed at this level, and it must give the whole side a massive confidence boost having 'Golden Gloves' behind them. Added to that, I've been most impressed with Toby this season. With a full pre-season behind him, we're really seeing his true potential and talent.



Hi everyone, and welcome to the latest instalment of our away day reviews, bringing you the highs and lows of the "Away Day" experience following our club Felixstowe & Walton Utd around the country.

A few days after the impressive County Cup victory over AFC Sudbury it was back to league action, and a new ground for most, if not all, visiting Seasiders today as we travel to the home of Cambridge City, The FWD-IP Community Stadium. The Lilywhites had been living a nomadic existence since leaving their Milton Road home in 2013, sharing twice with both Histon and St. Ives. Their new home hosted its first competitive match, a home defeat to Tilbury, as recently as the final day of November 2024.

The alarm sounded at 06:30 and within 5 minutes I was quietly (I believe) getting myself organised for the day. It is at this point that I probably should give a shout-out to Gabi, my significant other, my better half, my rock. Behind every man is a great woman, as the saying goes, and this is certainly the case for me. You see, every

weekday, Monday to Friday, Gabi spends the first 30-45 minutes of her day trying to get both me and our 8 year old son George out of our respective sleep comas and into a civilised state, fit to mix outdoors with society. She brings me up a cup of tea, tunes the wireless to Capital Radio with Jordan, Chris and Sian, slowly and gradually opens the curtains, general chit-chat, that sort of thing. George and I are not morning people. So, I can only imagine what must go through her mind when Saturday comes, and I am in the bathroom at 06:35 and it's me offering to make the cuppas!!!

It was just me and Lorro at the train station today. Our usual travelling companions were absent for a variety of reasons, including work, dog sitting and 5-day beanos with the CAMRA boys in Nottingham. We decided on the 07:28 train as the line between Needham Market and Bury St. Edmunds was due to be impacted for a few hours from late morning, so we were anticipating a relatively quiet early journey from lpswich. These hopes were soon dashed when we heard the guard announce that following overnight theft of some cabling in the llford

area, all London bound trains would terminate at Shenfield and that passengers for the capital and beyond should travel via Cambridge to Kings Cross.

On arrival at Ipswich, we headed over the bridge to platform 3 in the hope that our connection was ready and waiting. Sadly, it was not, but we were greeted for the second time this season by Billy Hollands dad and had a good natter about all things Billy. Our train, which began its journey in Harwich, soon arrived and Lorro and I managed to grab a table amongst the throng of theatre goers and University open day attendees that were having to go the long way round to reach their destination.

At Stowmarket, we were joined at our table by an 85 year old gentleman, and chatting to this man was the most humbling of experiences. He was going to visit his wife in Addenbrookes Hospital, where she is recovering from a stroke. He has made this journey every day for the past 9 weeks. After chatting about his wife and daily routine the subject naturally turned to football, and he took great pride in telling us that he is an ex-referee that reached the highest level of the game and had fond memories of Ipswich Town over the years. He delighted in telling us that he once took charge of a feisty Sheffield Utd v Sheffield Wednesday steel city derby at Bramall Lane in the old League Division 2.

Engrossed in the tales of yesteryear, we soon arrived into Cambridge, and my intention of helping ex-referee John to the taxi rank soon disappeared as he was up and away before you could say VAR. Despite his senior years and using a stick for balance, he needed no help from us. I expect after doing the journey daily for 9 weeks he knows exactly where to sit on the train to get to the taxi rank ahead of the masses.

Having been to Cambridge a few times recently, including 3 visits to The Corn Exchange on Wheeler Street to see Paul Weller, Ocean Colour Scene and From The Jam, as well as a rather forgetful League One fixture between Cambridge United and Lincoln City last season, the route towards the city centre was a well-trodden one. We soon found ourselves at The Regal on St

Andrews Street, another of J D Wetherspoons no frills establishments, but perfect for our needs on a Saturday morning.

We ignored all of the more comfortable tables and chairs tightly packed in to the three levels of this impressive former cinema, a venue graced over the years by the likes of The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, The Kinks, Manfred Mann and The Bee Gees, and decided a high table and tall chairs near the bar would suit us more. A lovely 2-3 hours of cheap beer, a more than adequate full English breakfast, and lots of football talk is certainly a good way to spend a Saturday morning. We were joined briefly by our old friend, Felixstowe exile and QPR fan Andrew Urguhart. Erky has lived in Cambridge for some years now and still comes back home from time to time to see his dear mum. He has yet to find his way to Delwood Avenue this side of the millennium though but has vowed to put that right sooner rather than later. As we departed the pub, we asked the youngsters at the nearest table if they would kindly take a quick photo of us for posterity. As we thanked them and prepared to leave, I told them we were Right Said Fred and to Google us. I really hope they did!!

The No. 7 bus to Saffron Walden was our chosen method of transport to Sawston. We told the driver we had no idea where our stop was, so she kindly told us she would give us a shout when we arrived. A pleasant enough journey







south via the hospital grounds and in no time at all (if 22 minutes is a loose definition of no time) we were off the bus and walking along leafy Cambridgeshire streets and into an industrial estate. Hardly the stuff that evokes childhood memories of seeing a new football ground for the first time. There were no tall floodlight pylons to guide us, no smell of burgers and fried onions. There was instead commercial units and industrial sized recycling bins, and a small trickle of cars heading, thankfully, in the same direction as we were walking. But its home for Cambridge City, and for that we are all thankful, no club should be without a ground of their own.



Upon exiting the turnstile block, it really was a lovely sight. Nice clean stands behind each goal and on the far side, and a very impressive main stand that will one day be the focal point of this famous old club. I say one day because now, only the seated outer shell of the stand is operational. The inside of the building has only recently started to be fitted out, getting the ground open to spectators was the priority. This means that the large, concreted area in front of the stand is mainly populated by club merchandise stands, food outlets and temporary toilet blocks, with the clubhouse in a prefabricated building next to the stand.

We found Mistley John, dog-sitting duties concluded and having driven up from Essex in plenty of time for kick-off and positioned ourselves behind the goal we were attacking. The game itself was a decent affair, with Tom Warren giving Felixstowe & Walton a deserved first half lead, a goal John missed as he was off getting an Algerian burger.

After the break, Cambridge threatened to equalise, but as has been the pattern for most of the season so far, the back line proved to be impenetrable, with Harry Wright again defying logic with some outstanding saves. Any visiting nerves were put to bed 2 minutes from time with Toby finding the net with a free kick from just outside the box. Game over, and another thoroughly deserved 3 points to take back to

the Suffolk coast. The only sour note from today was injuries to Billy and Noel, both guys coming off in the final 20 minutes or so and both looking to be in some discomfort.

Mistley John kindly offered to give us a lift back to Cambridge train station, but we declined as that is in the wrong direction entirely for him, but we did settle on a lift to the bus stop instead. I said my farewells to a few supporters waiting to board the coach, which possibly went on longer than necessary, as John casually remarked when I finally got in his car that he could have been back home by now!!

The bus journey was shared with a lovely fella called Glen (or Glenn, he never specified) who happens to be the tannoy announcer at Cambridge City, so a bit like Steve Foley but with a university education. Glen was very insightful about all things Cambridge and shared some lovely stories of bygone days, before we parted ways at the train station. Glen was heading to Kings Cross, and then to his home in Croydon, whilst Lorro and I were briefed by the Croydon Crooner as to the location of 2 pubs/bars close to the station, as our train was not due to depart until 1846. The first bar we peered in was not for us. It had noise and loud "young persons" music blasting through the open windows. We settled for a

lovely beer at The Old Ticket Office bar before heading across the road to the shop to stock up on provisions for the journey home.

If we thought our day was reaching a quiet conclusion, we were sadly mistaken. The journey to Ipswich was pleasant enough. We noticed that after the 18:46 departure there was another train departing at 19:01, so we decided to get the slightly later one instead. This was perfect as we had a near empty carriage, and as the train pulled into Newmarket station there wasn't even any tail-end race goers which was a bonus. Don't get me wrong, we'll chat to anyone, but fatigue was knocking at our doors, especially for Lorro, having come to the game straight off a night shift. We got the 20:58 train for Felixstowe, for the final leg of our 15-hour day, for a 90-minute game of football played 70 miles away.

Just before the approach to Westerfield station, the train stopped. It soon became evident it was not a red light, and as we were sat next to the cab at the end of the train, we were able to overhear the comms between the driver and train HQ. Points failure. Not the sort of points failure that our friends over at Brantham have to deal with on a weekly basis, but the sort that instantly made us realise that this train is not moving any time soon. In fact, the next time it moved it was back





whence it came, as we returned to Ipswich, with all services to FXT now cancelled until further notice.

Rather than now being home and relaxed, we instead found ourselves waiting at the customer service desk for a taxi, one of 3 or 4 that the huffing and perspiring customer service clerk was begrudgingly having to organise. I did tell him on more than one occasion that we were personal friends with Mr Holland and should really be afforded priority, but sadly as we were last off the train it appeared we would be in the last taxi to arrive. That last line should not really be required, as outside Ipswich station we counted 14 taxis that were stood idle waiting for fares. Inside the station, around 12-15 passengers were waiting for taxis to arrive. It was at this point I remembered that in a couple of hours or so, the control of Greater Anglia was being transferred back to public ownership, as part of the renationalisation of the railways. It was almost as if Greater Anglia were spending every last pound left in the kitty and reminded me of the time the out-going Labour Treasury Minister Liam Byrne(\*) left a note for his replacement after the 2010 General Election defeat which read.....Dear Chief Secretary, I'm afraid there is no money left.

Eventually, a taxi with our name on it did arrive, although the driver was reluctant to let us in until he had verified we were the correct passengers.

I think the cabbie may have had shares in Tesla as he spent most of the journey telling us all about the positives of owning a fully electric car. We just wanted to talk about the likely starting XI for the huge match in a weeks' time against Maldon & Tiptree, should Billy and Noel be unavailable. The cabbie won, they can talk for England, so we listened politely to his 14 positives of going green.

I finally got home around 11pm, around 90 minutes later than expected. Gabi was still up, and a cup of tea was waiting for me. It's true what they say about great women.

## **MANAGEMENT**

#### **Jack Ainsley - Manager**

Rejoined for a second spell at the club from Stowmarket in 2023. Jack played professionally for ITFC after coming through their academy and went on to make four appearances playing under Roy Keane. Jack went on to have spells at Step 2 with Lowestoft and Step 3 with Leiston but is back at the Seaside as player/joint manager with brother Stuart.

#### Stuart Ainsley - Manager

Stuart joined the club for his second spell in 2014 from Lowestoft Town. Previous clubs include Chelmsford City, Canvey Island and AFC Sudbury. Stuart spent ten years at Ipswich Town, winning the FA Youth Cup in 2005. Having spent the last 11 years playing for Felixstowe, began his management career alongside brother Jack in May 2025.

#### Stuart Stevensen - Fitness Coach



# THE OTHER SIDE: CONCORD RANGERS FC

Concord Rangers began life as a team of boys headed by Steve Lant playing friendly matches during 1966 on a pitch along the Canvey Island seafront close to the Concord Beach (hence the name Concord Rangers and the nickname The Beach Boys). In 1967 Albert Lant. Steve's father and current Club President, became the team manager and took the club into competitive football. The club initially joined the Thundermite Boys Football League, before moving into the Vange and District League in 1973 where they won several league and cup honours. Concord became the first winners of the Essex Sunday Junior Trophy in 1979, managed then by Chris Crerie, by beating Bishops Park 4-0, with the final being played at Tiptree FC. Saturday football was introduced to the club shortly after when Concord joined the Mid Essex League and played their home games at Waterside Farm on Canvey Island.

In 1985 Concord secured some land at the end of Thames Road, Canvey Island, using that land to develop the clubhouse and ground with current club treasurer Jack Smith being the mastermind behind the project. Jack organised the funds, labour & materials and worked many hours on the site. A special mention also goes to the late Clive Smith (Jack's brother) as without Clive's machinery and labour Concord's pitch would not exist, also Martin Gill, Steve Barnes, Brian Godfrey, Lee and John Slater, Rob Fletcher, Pat Bennett, Roger Tipthorpe, Barry Clark, Tony Ing and many more all contributed.

Further success came the Beach Boys way in 1988/89 as they joined the Essex Intermediate League and became Divisional League & Cup Winners that year. Two years later Concord Rangers made the step up to the Essex Senior League where they spent a total of 17 seasons.





In 1991 club founder Albert Lant retired as chairman after 25 years at the helm to become Club President, with Jack Smith taking over for two years. Grant Beglan became Chairman when Jack stood down, but like his predecessor only held the role for 2 years. A number of Chairman held the role from 1995 & in 1998 the club was languishing at the bottom of the Essex Senior League, the youth section had been disbanded and the bar licence had not been renewed meaning no revenue could be made for the club.

Former Chairman Jack Smith's son Antony decided to step in and put a new committee together along with a plan to put the club back on its feet. Antony is very hands-on in his approach, which has helped guide the club through recent successes and the development on both the playing side & with the ground/facilities.

Under the guidance of manager Colin Mcbride, the Beach Boys won the Essex Senior League Cup in 1997 after beating Ford United 1-0, and the following season under Lee Patterson won the Essex Senior League Championship for the first time. Further cup success came during the 1999/2000 season with former player Steve Knott in charge as Concord beat Burnham Ramblers 3-2 to win the Harry Fisher Memorial Trophy. League success followed soon after as under manager Brain Horne the club finished as Essex Senior League runners up in 2002/03, and then won the league the following season with Ben Embury at the helm. It was during that 2003/04 season that striker Danny Heale won the Don Douglas trophy for being the leagues top scorer, notching up 32 goals for Concord Rangers.

As Concord Rangers began their 40 th Anniversary season in 2007/08, Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley become joint managers of the club. Concord ended the season winners of the Essex Senior League, and were Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy winners along with Essex Senior League Cup Finalists.

Concord also reached the Quarter-final of the FA Vase that year. Club President Albert Lant won an outstanding achievement award from the Essex County Football Association for 40 years unbroken service to Concord Rangers.

Having gained promotion from the Essex Senior League the club would have been happy with a mid table finish in their Ryman League Div 1 North debut in 2008/09, but expectations were exceeded as the two Dannys led Concord to a 5 th place finish.

This highlighted how both managers could really get the best out of the players. Beating East Thurrock United in the Playoff Semi-Final set up a final vs Waltham Abbey, in which Concord led with 10 minutes to go before future Beach Boy Harry Elmes levelled things for Abbey, taking the game to penalties which we lost 5-4.

Concord didn't have to wait long to earn promotion though, as the following season they again reached the playoff final, this time beating Enfield Town 3-1 to reach the Ryman Premier Division. The clubs first season in the Ryman Premier Division was a solid one, finishing in 8th place, which exceeded the target of simply avoiding relegation! Earning that respectful 8th spot and just missing out on a Play-Off position by two points was a great team effort.

2011/12 was a difficult season for the Beach Boys, as injuries to key players contributed to a poor start which was never wholly recovered from. Concord managed to finish the season in 14th though and secured a third season at this level. Danny Scopes retired from his post as joint manager, and soon afterwards Glen Alzapiedi was appointed as Danny Cowley's Assistant Manager. Another poor start was made by the club in 2012/13, but this was recovered from quickly and the Beach Boys displayed a never say die attitude to earn some incredible results both at home and away. Concord found themselves in the playoffs come the seasons end along with the Ryman League Cup final. Two fantastic away performances in the play offs saw us promoted to the highest level of football we've played at and a great performance in the cup final saw us end the season with 2 trophies.

The Beachboys lost their 2013/14 first Conference South fixture, however were soon picking up points regularly with determined & professional performances against some of the biggest teams at this level. Although there were a couple of harsh results, there was a level of consistency many didnt expect to see against this





opposition, this helped Concord reach what was a spectacular 9 th place finish by seasons end. To cap it all off, The Beachboys were able to win the Essex Senior Cup against Braintree as the football season came to a close.

2014/15 was a season of historical moments, but started with 3 losses out of 4 games. Fortunes quickly turned around for the club as eventually a 7 th place finish was achieved (a 13 game unbeaten run being a key contributor). The most incredible moment of the season was Concord Rangers reaching the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn away to Mansfield Town, Concord earned a 1-1 draw before losing 1-0 in the replay in front of 1500 at the Aspect Arena. The second round of the FA Trophy was reached, also for the first time. A penalty shootout filled Essex Senior Cup run saw Concord retain the trophy they'd won a year before, this time beating Billericay in the final. At the seasons end manager Danny Cowley & his assistant manager brother Nicky (who took over from Alzapiedi in September) left the club for pastures new.

2015-16 was a season of rebuilding with Adam Flanagan & Jody Brown in charge of the side which had lost a number of key players, whilst trying to maintain our National League south position. A poor start saw Brown replaced with the returning Alzapiedi as assistant manager, and things looked up. A 12 game unbeaten run at the start of 2016 helped the side reach their 3 rd Essex Senior Cup final in as many years, making history in the April when beating Heybridge Swifts to retain the cup. A mid table finish guaranteed another season of National League South football.

2017/18 saw the Beachboys put an impressive 13 game unbeaten run together at one point, however the poor start and shaky end to the season saw the side stave off relegation by just a couple of points, which saw Flan and Glen be relieved of their positions.

Prior to the 2018/19 season, Sammy Moore and Jack Midson were brought in to take charge of the first team, as Concord Rangers looked to make their 6 th season at this level a successful one, and a success it was as the club finished in 6 th place. However due to ground grading issues, Concord were unable to take part in the playoffs.

Moore & Midson left the club by mutual consent, after which an old favourite returned to take the helm as Danny Scopes was appointed first team manager for the 2019/20 season.

Scopesy enlisted the help of Lee Minshull, James Roach and Adam Drew for his time in sole charge of the Beachboys, and while the league form started well, it was the historic FA Trophy run that really set the tone for the year. Two seasons of prematurely ending league campaigns were the result of the pandemic, but Scopesy's reign was capped off by a historic appearance in the FA Trophy Final at Wembley, losing 1-0 to Harrogate Town.

A new dawn beckoned as in the off season Danny Scopes resigned his position as 1st team manager and Ant Smith stepped down after 21 successful years as chairman. lack Smith Inr and John Smith assumed the interim chairman position off pitch and on the pitch under 18s manager Chris Search was brought in to lead the first team alongside Danny Green and Craig Shipman. After starting the season with a fantastic win over league favourites Dorking, the team were entertaining to watch but lacked consistency. The club went out of both FA competitions at the 1st stage but had a successful Essex Senior Cup campaign, culminating in a 4-3 defeat to Billericay in the semi final. The league campaign picked up towards the end and the management team led us to a final position of 14th and will be looking to build on this next season.

After a poor start to the 2022/23 season, and a winless run throughout September and October, the



decision was made between both the club and Chris Search to make a change in management. As November was about to get under way, former Concord player and Bowers manager Rob Small took the reigns at Thames Road, with the aim being to secure the Beachboys place in the National League South for another year. Fixture congestion played a factor towards the end of the season however, and ultimately the Beachboys were relegated back into the Isthmian Premier Division.

The summer then meant it was a time to rebuild, and former Beachboys player Sammy Collins was appointed as first team manager, bringing in an almost entirely new squad which included a number of familiar faces from his time as a player.

## THE COPPER RIVER

Stories exist of provincial clubs challenging the established elite, and occasionally winning in the most incredible stories. We've seen it in the UK, most recently with Leicester taking the Premier League title in a season that nobody thought would be possible again. Their near neighbours Nottingham Forest went one better, dominating Europe just two years after clambering out of the Second Division. But both of those clubs had history and tradition. In Chile, it was shown that this could be done from a standing start. And not just winning, but becoming a powerhouse. All it took was an impassioned fanbase, managerial ambition, and not a little bit of money.

Club de Deportes Cobreloa were formed in 1977, the same year that Brian Clough was leading Forest into the top flight. The region in which they played, Calama, had two prominent amateur teams in the middle of the twentieth century, but locals in the prosperous mining town increasingly felt it important that they were represented by a professional outfit. Deep in the Atacama desert, Calama gained its wealth through copper mining, and the company that ran that operation - CODELCO - decided to put its weight behind a football team. Named for the river that runs through the town, the Loa, and for the Spanish word for copper, 'Cobre', Cobreloa were formed. They joined the Chilean second division, but with mining wealth behind them they had a squad formed of players from some of Chile's best sides (and some from further afield). Among them,

however, was a 17 year old Armando Alarcon, who would become a legend in Calama and play for the national side, spending his entire career with Cobreloa. They secured promotion through the playoffs in their first season. By 1978, they had joined the elite.

Led by former Espanyol forward Andrew Prieto, Cobreloa weren't content merely to consolidate their place in the top flight. Their first ever match at that level was against the biggest giants of Chilean football, Colo-Colo. Eleven time champions and Copa Libertadores runners up. they were meant to provide a stiff test for the newly promoted side, but Cobreloa were he to stay. They brushed the Santiago giants aside 4-2, and it set the tone for a remarkable season. They overcame the likes of Universidad and O'Higgins, Chilean powerhouses, but were pipped to the title by Deportivo Palestino, a team formed by the Palestinian diaspora in Chile. The the playoffs that followed to decide a European place, Cobreloa picked up just one point and finished bottom. 1979 saw a repeat of this disappointment, missing out on the title by ten points to Colo-Colo. But nobody saw what the 1980s were to bring.

Heavy investment saw the replacement of Prieto by Vicente Cantatore, and the recruitment of national team stars like Oscar Wirth and Enzo Escobar, along with the addition of homegrown prospects like Hector Puebla. It was a long, hard season, that went to the final day. But as Universidad

dropped points, Cobreloa won and secured their first title. Just as impressively, they didn't lose at home, and wouldn't lose at home until 1985, a 91 match streak that remains unsurpassed. The following year they lost their title as they focused on continental ambitions, reaching the final of the Copa Libertadores, holding Brazilian powerhouses Flamengo over two legs, before losing the playoff through goals from Zico. They returned the following year, only to lose to Penarol, although they did secure the 1983 Chilean title again.

Two trophyless years followed, before another shake up and Jorge Toro was tasked with delivering the title again in 1985, something he was just able to do, beating Everton by two points. But two third place finishes followed, before a final title of the decade in 1988, beating Cobresal, a second mining-funded team who sprung up a couple of years after Cobreloa, in Atacama.

Cobreloa won an unlikely title in 1992, despite starting slowly. They ended the season with a 26 game winning streak, beating Colo-Colo by two points on the final day. And then mid-table mediocrity set in, as the provincial side slowly began to drift. They watched Colo-Colo, with whom they had developed a rivalry, begin to truly dominate Chilean football.

Unlikely titles came in 2003 and 2004, the second of which was won in a playoff in Santiago against Colo-Colo, in what supporters call 'The Year of Orange', (the colour of copper, which Cobreloa had adopted as a shirt colour). But despite this high point, lows were to follow as international investment into the Santiago clubs made it difficult to compete. The side once again slipped toward the bottom of the table, and by the 2010s relegation was a real possibility.

In 2015, amid restricted investment from CODELCO, it finally happened, and Cobreloa dropped into the second tier for the first time since their founding season. And that's where they are today. But their story just goes to show that, with the right kind of support, anyone can achieve.

Enjoy the game.

#### BY JON COUCH

FOR managers, it's an extra three minutes to deliver the finishing touches to your pre-match team talk.

For fans, it's a chance to grab a quick coffee or spend in the warmth of the clubhouse bar.

Three minutes. One hundred and eighty seconds. It doesn't sound a lot, but it could make all the difference to the National League's 3UP campaign as it continues to ramp up pressure on the EFL to finally put a third promotion spot into League Two on the agenda.

This afternoon, over 200 clubs from Steps 1 to 4 will kick-off at 3.03pm in 'A Day of Action' to raise awareness on the issue with the Premier League and a large percentage of the EFL away on international duty.

National League chiefs and clubs have been pushing for an extra promotion place for a number of years to align with the rest of the English pyramid.

But while the EFL acknowledge it should be up for debate, the matter is yet to be officially brought to the table despite chairman Rick Parry's promise to "look downwards as well as upwards".

A recent Football Supporters' Association poll revealed 93 per cent of all supporters support the move, while 83 per cent of fans of EFL clubs are so in favour.

But Football League chiefs say any deal would have to form part of any funding agreement with the Premier League so with the two bodies at a stalemate amid the wait for the incoming Independent Football Regulator, National League chiefs have decided to up the stakes amid fears it could be years before EFL clubs vote on any changes.

National League vice-chairman and chair of the 3UP steering committee Steve Thompson MBE has been a key part of the push and he wants their message heard.

He told The NLP last week: "The games kicking off at 3.03pm is really going to shine a spotlight on it.

"We've got MPs from all over the country going to these games.

"It's not just the 12 National League games. While National League North and South aren't playing league games because it's FA Trophy, the Trident Leagues are also supporting it. That's fantastic.

"The whole football family at Non-League level sees how important it is."

So important that, In recent months, clubs and the league have been engaging with their local MPs with more than 100 – and members of the London Assembly – pledging their support.

And last week Sir Keir Starmer "commended" 3UP at Prime Minister's Questions with over 60 MP's actively supporting the campaign.

The Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) has formally "recognised" that 3UP's ambitions tie-in with the football regulator's objectives with a Backbench Business Debate planned later this month, as well as two supportive Early Day Motions.

"I was blown away," Thompson said of the political support received.

"So many MPs are season ticket holders at their local club. They realise how much their clubs do in their community. They realise how much the owners and chairs of those clubs do in the community.

"The fear is if you have this bottleneck and owners don't think there is a realistic chance of being promoted they will walk away. You need that competitiveness. It creates a healthy eco-system in football and that's what we face losing.

"The EFL say they've got to look down as well as up. Well, look down a bit more."  $% \begin{center} \end{center} \begin{center} \end{center}$ 

History shows there is no competitive imbalance between the National League and League Two.

No club has ever been relegated back into Non-League the season after they won promotion while Luton Town went through to the Premier League and others, including Yeovil Town, Doncaster, Burton Albion and Wrexham, have reached the Championship.

"There's over 30 clubs in the EFL that have been in the National League at some stage or another," Thompson added.

"There's Wrexham now in the Championship. There are 19 League Two clubs that have been in National League. Half of the National League have been in the EFL.

"There's nothing to fear but there is this bottleneck."

This afternoon, fans from clubs up and down the country will be involved both on the terraces and via social media making their voices heard.

For 180 seconds at least the floor is theirs. That's got to be worth raising a glass to.


















# PITCHING IN ISTHMIAN LEAGUE NORTH ROUND UP

Felixstowe win again, Maldon do the same, and we've also wins for Gorleston, Jockeys, Redbridge, Hall, Lowestoft, City, Regent, Takeley and Downham - and red cards galore

Leaders **Felixstowe and Walton United**, who this week were awarded a second successive Vita Risk Manager of the Month Award this season and yet another Mitre Golden Gloves award to sit alongside it, travelled to East London to take on **Walthamstow**. The Seasiders had taken twenty eight points from the previous thirty available to them, and conceded only three goals all season, whilst their hosts were six without a win but had drawn their previous three.

United went ahead on twenty seven minutes, Tom Warren the scorer, but the hosts managed to score an equaliser in first half added time, Joe Elliott with the goal- the first conceded by United for three hundred and fifteen minutes. The next goal arrived twenty minutes from time, and it went to Felixstowe, Sam Ford restoring their lead- and this time they held on for three more points. They remain four points clear at the top.

Title favourites **Maldon and Tiptree**, in second place, welcomed **Waltham Abbey**. The Jammers had lost only once all season, the Abbotts had lost two in a row but had been in good form prior to that, and the points were crucial for the promotion

hopes of both sides. A red card for the visitors Kieron Cathline on twenty five minutes handed the initiative to the Jammers, and it was soon top get worse for the visitors, a red card for Matthew Price seeing them down to nine. In first half added time, rather unbelievably, the visitors had a third player dismissed, Edwin Mensah the latest sinner, but by then the Jammers had-rather unsurprisinglygone ahead, Tom Eastman the scorer. How much worse would it get for the EIGHT men in the second half.

Anisius Lewis added a second four minutes after the break, Tevan Allen quickly made it three, and just after the hour Freddie Sears added a fourth. Louis Dunne delivered a fifth with seventeen minutes left, and Macauley Bonne got number six three minutes from time. Finally the pain stopped for the visitors, six-nil the final score.

Third place **Wroxham** were at home to fourth from bottom **Brightlingsea Regent**, the Yachtsmen looking for a third win in succession, Regent to bounce back after two defeats. The visitors got the first goal of the afternoon after only eight minutes, Daniel Rowe with it, and they got the second, too, Jake Clowsley sixteen minutes later. The hosts hit back twelve minutes after the break, James Moore hoping to have started a comeback - and indeed he had, as fourteen minutes from time Jordan King drew Wroxham level. That looked to be that- but it wasn't! Four minutes into added time Regent were awarded a penalty, and Ola Bello stuck it away to give the visitors the points. Regent climb to seventeenth.

Gorleston, in fourth, welcomed Witham Town, both sides in decent form. Town took an early lead, Ben Allen the scorer, but the Greens were level just before the break, Rossi Jarvis making it one-one- and there was still time for Connor Ingram to give them the lead from the spot. Ten minutes from time Town drew level trough Ziad Bakaar, but then things went rather wrong for the visitors. First, Zach Dronfield restored the hosts lead, and then added time saw not one but two Witham red cards, Ernest Okoh and then Archie McFadden dismissed. The Greens go third.

Bowers and Pitsea travelled to Lowestoft
Town hoping to bounce back after losing their last two, and the visitors took the lead eleven minutes before half time, Michael Faulkner with his fourteenth in sixteen matches. The Trawler Boys were level seven minutes after the break, Sam Aldous with the equaliser, and that sparked a home onslaught, Aaron Bullent making it two-one just after the hour and William Unadike quickly adding a third. Jamie Salmon pulled it back to three-two twelve minutes from time, but that was soon followed by a Bowers red card, George Scales dismissed, and the hosts held on for three points. Bowers slip to seventh.

Sixth place **Newmarket Town** travelled to take on a **Grays Athletic** side who had only one defeat from nine, and the Jockeys were immediately ahead, Stan Leech with an impressive seventeenth goal in fifteen matches. Josh Lee made it two eleven minutes before half time, and Leech added a third with nineteen minutes left. Things got worse for the hosts when Joe Jude saw red, and Newmarket held onto their three goal lead and took three points- and fifth place.

**Redbridge** were looking to get back to winning ways as they travelled to **Brantham Athletic**, whilst their hosts were still hoping for their first win of the season. The opening goal arrived in first half added time, and it went to the Motormen, Malachi Napa scoring it - and as it turned out, the opening goal was the only goal. The Motormen are sixth, Athletic fourteen points from safety.

Concord Rangers arrived at Mildenhall Town looking for a fifth unbeaten match in a row, the previous four bringing three wins- but it was Hall who went ahead eight minutes before half time, Jonathan Kaye with the opener. The Beachboys were level just before the hour, Sherquan Toussaint with that one, but Hall were almost immediately ahead once more, Adam Capel making it two-one. Hall held onto what they had, and are ninth as a result.

Cambridge City welcomed Tilbury, seventeenth v eighteenth, both sides improving- and City went ahead just before the half hour, Usman Udeniji opening the scoring. Six minutes before half time they added another, this one from the spot, with George Smith scoring for the third game in succession, and just after the hour Jayden Randell made it three. Tilbury spoiled City's stadium opening party last season - revenge was certainly served. City are up to fourteenth.

**Stanway Rovers** were hit by a Charlie Royle double for **Downham Town**, the goals arriving on seven and eighteen minutes, but got back into the match on the half hour, Nat Mardell keeping his cool from the spot, and were level nine minutes later, Harrison Chatting with the equaliser. The match was to have a fifth goal, and it arrived seven minutes from time, Dylan Edge giving Town the edge, and three points. They remain second from bottom, but are now only two points from safety.

Takeley took on Heybridge Swifts, but it was Swifts who took the lead, Jack Adlington-Pile taking only eight minutes to open the scoring. The visitors were soon down to ten men, Mason Gillam sent off, and ten minutes into the second half they went down to nine, substitute Josh Parker departing. The hosts immediately levelled, Jack Mitchell the scorer, but the nine men regained the lead ten minutes later, Rob Harvey making it two-one. Swifts weren't ahead for long, Olly Miles equalising - and thirteen minutes from time the hosts were ahead, Zak Drake making it three-two. Takeley are fourth from bottom, but only one point from safety.

#### **TUESDAY 11TH NOVEMBER**

Gorleston headed to Mildenhall Town, the Greens looking for a fourth win in five. Their hosts have been in decent form, but the visitors were ahead on eight minutes and two up three minutes later, Connor Ingram and Spencer Keller the scorers. Hall quickly got one back, Ben Nolan with his sixth of the season, but the Greens ensured that they climbed to second by adding a third goal just after the hour, Joe Marsden the scorer.

Gorleston are three points behind leaders Felixstowe and Walton United, having played two matches more than the Seasiders. They have a one point advantage over third place Maldon & Tiptree, but have played four games more than the Jammers.

**Bowers and Pitsea** had seen their promotion hopes hit by three defeats in a row, but they went ahead against **Walthamstow** in first half added time - an own goal giving them a helping hand. As it turned out, that was all the help they needed, as they held on for three points despite a late red card for Ross Wall.

Waltham Abbey looked to bounce back from Saturday's debacle at Maldon as they took on Takeley, and they went ahead on nineteen minutes courtesy of Amrit Bansal-Mcnulty, quickly following up three minutes later with another from Kai Brown. The second half saw Brown score two more and take a match ball, taking his tally to eight for the season, and that was followed by the Abbotts fifth goal, scored by Matt Price. **Stanway Rovers** saw a five match unbeaten run-containing four draws - come to an end against **Downham Town** at the weekend, but they had a fine start against Lowestoft Town, Tom Mayhew taking only three minutes to put them ahead. The Trawler Boys chances of a recovery were hit once more just before the hour, Harrison

Chatting making it two-nil, and it was to get worse for the visitors as Nat marvel added a third and George Okoye scored a fourth. Four-nil the final score, Rovers fourteenth- but only six points away from the top five with two games in hand.

Cambridge City were in superb form, and looking for a fourth win in a row as they welcomed **Newmarket Town**. City went ahead on eleven minutes, Jett Murphy with his third in six matches, and nine minutes later the lead was doubled, George Smith scoring the second from the spot. That was his sixth of the season, and the fourth match in a row in which he'd found the net. Four minutes from time Codey Cosgrave rounded things off; three goals, three points and up to twelfth for the hosts.

**Tilbury** travelled to **Concord Rangers**, and the Dockers went ahead five minutes before half time, Jack Hayes the scorer- but they ended the first half with ten men, Luke Reeve sent off in added time. Despite that disadvantage, it looked as if they would hold on for victory- only for the Beachboys to level three minutes into added time, Bobby Kelman scoring his eighth of the season and earning his side a point.

Brightlingsea Regent had won four of their last six and were slowly climbing away from the drop zone. With only two wins from ten visitors Heybridge Swifts were worried that they were heading in the opposite direction, and those worries increased when Dan Rowe put Regent ahead on twenty seven minutes, and an own goal soon caused even greater concern, two-nil to the hosts at the break. Sixteen minutes from time the hosts added a third and secured the points, Charlie Durling rounding off victory. Regent climb to fifteenth-two points and two places above their visitors.
